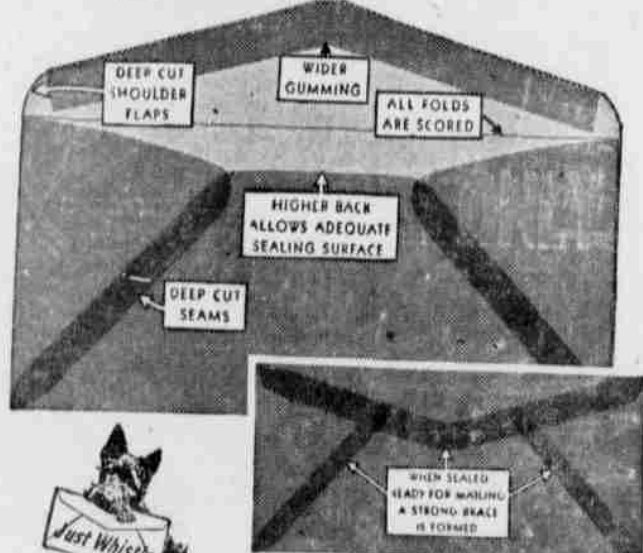

In scoring the lowest accident rate among all Class 1 roads for the nineteenth time in the past 29 years, Union Pacific with a total of 112,596,000 man-hours worked scored 3.40 employe casualties per million.

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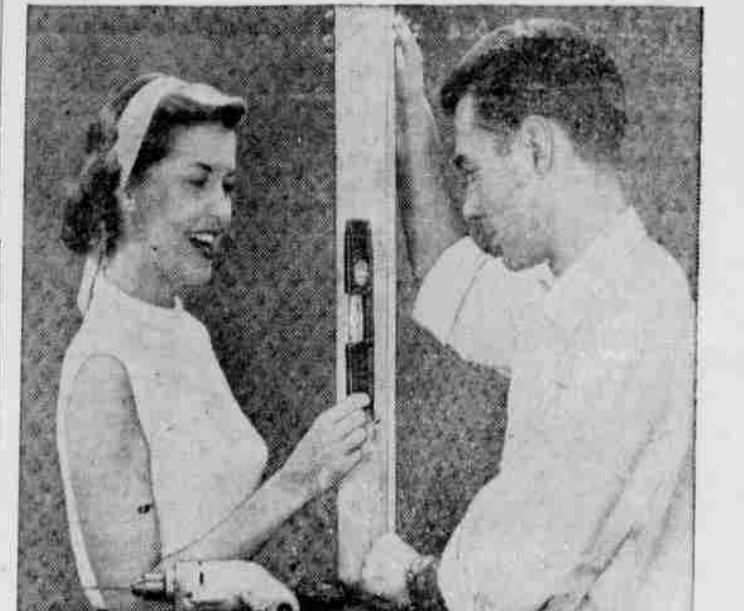
