## P P & L Office Soon to Occupy New Building

The Pacific Power & Light company office here will be in a new location beginning Monday, September 15 according to J. R. Huffman, local manager. New headquarters will be in the building recently completed by Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Collins next door to the Heppler Cleaners.

The new structure has an offset recessed doorway of modern design, with a harmonious combination of display windows and brick facing. The office interior has been arranged to provide maximum customer convenience.

"The office change comes at a good time," Huffman said. "With the major portion of the 1952 construction program in Morrow county virtually completed, we can take the move in our stride." Huffman explained that new substation additions in Heppler and transmission line work on the Company's 22,000-volt Ione-Heppler line has brought the utility company's post-war investment in its Heppler system to \$360,000.

The most recent construction job, completed this past summer increased sub-station capacity for the Heppler distribution system by 75 per cent. Huffman said that the substation has been almost completely rebuilt. Last year, voltage regulators were added and in 1950 a new oil circuit breaker was installed at the power center.

Major post-war power improvement in this section of the Pacific Power system has been construction of the Ione-Heppler 22,000-volt transmission line and development of a new source of supply through Hermiston, Huffman said.

Through an interchange arrangement, Pacific now brings power for this area from its Hermiston substation to Jordan by way of a Columbia Basin REA line. Power used here formerly came from Dufur.

Other major items included in the company's \$360,000 investment in the area includes the doubling of substation capacity at both Ione and Lexington and the installation of new and modern street lighting fixtures in Heppler, Ione and Lexington.

## HORSE SHOW ATTRACTS 167 ENTRIES; NAMES OF DIVISION WINNERS LISTED

The Morrow county horse show held on Friday, September 5 at the Heppler Fair and Rodeo grounds was outstanding in number of entries, quality of horses entered and the horsemanship displayed.

Halter classes and performance divisions were judged by Les Marks, Wheeler County Extension Agent, Fossil who stated that he did not know where one would go to find better quality of horses at a county fair than were entered in the show at Heppler. Mr. Marks further stated that he judged at the Morrow County Show two years ago and that he was amazed to find the marked improvement in the quality and number of horses since the later date.

An enthusiastic and interested audience witnessed 167 Morrow County horse entries judged in the halter class of mares, the amateur cow cutting division, western pleasure horse class and the stock horse performance lot.

Most of the horses were the thoroughbreds, quarterhorses or Arabians. Many of those animals were registered and others of top quality grade stock.

A junior performance division on Shetland and Welch ponies provided interesting entertainment for the audience.

Fred Mankin, Heppler, superintendent of the Horse Show recalls that five years ago there were only 6 entries in a similar show. Due to lack of interest a Horsheshow was not scheduled 4 years ago. Mr. Mankin believes there is a real future in the horse business in Morrow County because of the number and quality of young horses in the show and the number of children who took part in the show.

He expressed his appreciation to the members of the Morrow County Riding Club who so cooperatively and efficiently assisted him with the show.
