Mrs. Floyd Adams drove to Portland last Tuesday to take her father home and to take her daughter Nancy to the train to leave for Mills College in California.

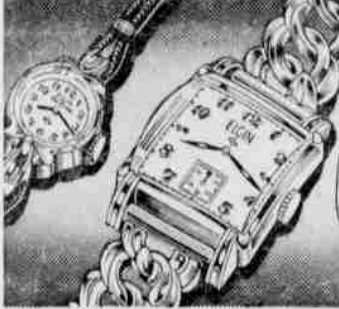

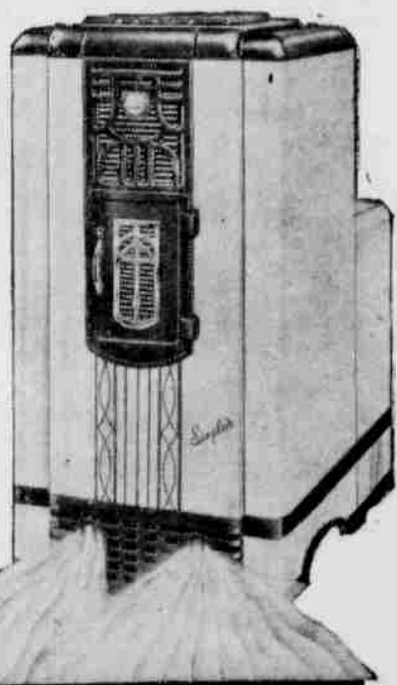
