This year, October 5th to 11th is Fire Prevention Week. It serves as a reminder that 90% of all fires are PREVENTABLE.

In 1951, a fire occurred on an average, nearly every minute of the day and night. Half of these fires were in homes. The caused destruction in excess of \$730,000,000. Another 11% from misuse of electricity, 13% from overheated plants or defective chimney flues.

Do yourself a favor. Make a complete list of fire hazards affecting your property. Then one by one, UPROOT them.

And don't forget to think about fire prevention not just one, but fifty-two weeks in the year. In fact, every day observe the cautions of fire prevention. You'll be glad you did!
