Funeral services were held for Leo Root Monday afternoon at the Boardman Community church at 2 p. m. with the Misses Jean Scott

Leo Vincent Root, son of Roxie Ann Goble and Charles Root, was born August 1, 1884 in Nora Springs, Iowa. He was united in marriage to Florence Mefford, on June 5, 1912. To this union two sons were born, Vernon, now of Athena, and Richard, who preceded his father in death February 1927.

November 1, 1918 the family moved to Boardman and since it has been the family home. Surviving besides his widow and son Vernon are two grandsons Curtis and Maurice Root, Athena.

Mr. Root was the first appointed mail carrier in Boardman and has been assistant to Mrs. Root as postmaster since.

He was a charter member of the Modern Woodman of America and was an Elder and very active member of the Boardman Presbyterian Community church. He had many friends who will miss him keenly, but his influence will

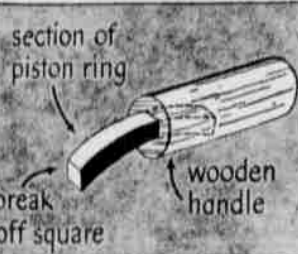

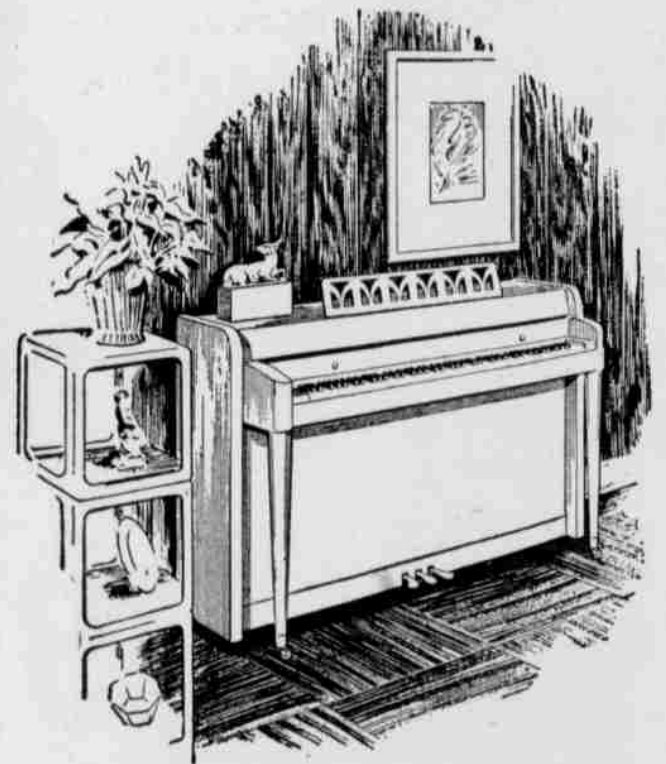
