HIGH HONORS were accorded 4-H'ers for top records in the 1952 National 4-H Achievement, Frozen Foods, Citizenship and Leadership programs. Highlights of their club careers are given below.

Recognition has been accorded Donald Sorenson, 20, of Corvallis, and Frances Hughson, 18, of Albany, for superior records of achievement. The 4-H Achievement award is based upon over-all project accomplishment, production records and club and community activity. In ten years Donald has completed many projects such as dairy, garden, soil and water conservation and field crops. The latter won him a trip to Club Congress as state winner. His other awards included the county award for highest potato yield per acre, high point individual in judging and showmanship and numerous grand champions in cattle. In his second year at Oregon State he also serves his club as leader.

She is now organizing her own 4-H knitting club in which she plans to combine various forms of recreation with knitting. For the past few years she has been teaching recreation at Camp Cotton 4-H Summer School.
