U of O School Gets New Fund Gift

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, (Special)—A gift of \$1000 has been received by the University of Oregon school of journalism for the Eric W. Allen Memorial Fund. The gift is from the Eugene Register-Guard, announced Dean Gordon A. Sabine.

The second such addition made to the fund by the Eugene newspaper, the gift is used to support the Eric W. Allen Memorial Fellowship in the journalism school. This fellowship, awarded last year to Harold Hughes, city editor of the Astorian-Budget, is presented annually to an outstanding journalist for study at the University school.

Selection of candidates for the fellowship is made by a three-member committee which includes Alton F. Baker, Sr., publisher of the Eugene Register-Guard, the president of the board of trustees of the Allen Fund, and Dean Sabine.

The Allen Fund, and the fellowship which is part of it, have been established to honor the memory of the first dean of the University's journalism school, Eric W. Allen, who headed the school from 1912 until his death in 1944.

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ways to be a friendly telephone neighbor

Here's a sauce to remember. It elevates a fish or chicken loaf usually strictly family fare, to "company class." To 1 cup medium thick white sauce add 1/4 cup sliced stuffed olives and 1/4 cup toasted slivered almonds. Just before serving, stir in 1/4 cup real mayonnaise. Serves 3 to 4.

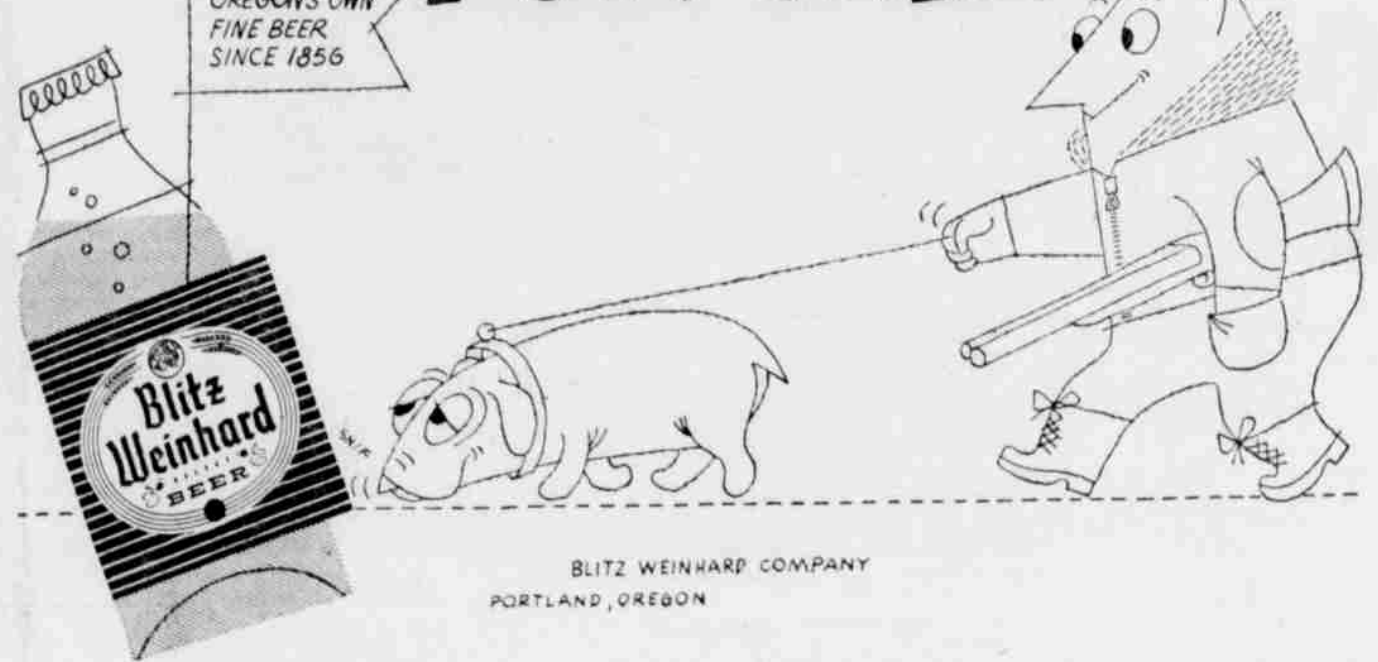
