

Mustangs Split Two In Week's Cage Play

Heppner high school's Mustangs, playing without the services of Roland Taylor, starting guard, who is out with the flu, defeated Fossil 67-53 in a Big Wheat League contest Friday night, but were edged by the Ione Cardinals 53-50 in a Cayuse conference game Saturday.

Heppner started out strong in the Fossil game, gaining a 24-15 first quarter bulge, and still held the lead 37-29 at halftime. They increased their lead to 54-39 at the end of the third period and then coasted to their 67-53 victory.

Easily the best individual player of the game was Fossil's DeWynne Keimig, jump shot artist who potted 33 points in a losing cause. Mike Grant, Heppner's 6 foot 2 forward not only took top rebounding honors with 16 but also led the Mustangs in point-making with 19. Sophomore Dick Kononen scored 17.

The B squad had little trouble downing Fossil's JV's 51-31 with Dale Stager scoring 19 points.

Heppner showed once again they are a second half club Saturday night as the Ione Cardinals jumped to an 18-10 first period lead and still led 33-22 at halftime. The Mustangs settled down in the second half, and had shortened the lead to 44-36 at the end of the third quarter. Heppner came back strong in the final quarter, coming within one point of the Cardinals during the final moments of the game. The final whistle, though, found Ione leading 53-50.

Jack Sumner, Heppner center, took scoring honors for the game with 21, while Mike Grant sank 15. Top scorer for Ione was Duane Baker with 13.

In the preliminary, the Ione Bs edged Heppner 41-36.

Next Friday, the Mustangs meet the Big Wheat League leader, Arlington on the local floor. Heppner is now in second place and a win over the Honkers would put them in a tie for first. Saturday night they travel to Fossil to meet the Falcons again.

Vets To Get First Chance At Farm Units

World War II veterans are given priority in the purchase of 11 fulltime farm units in the first public land opening of 1953 in the Columbia basin project. Vere McCarty, service officer for the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs, said today.

Veterans' applications for the offering, listed by the federal Bureau of Reclamation as public announcement No. 12, must be filed in the bureau's office at Ephrata, Washington, by February 27 to receive priority.

The 11 farm units to be sold in the Quincy-Columbia basin irrigation district, Grant county, Washington, in the northwestern part of the Columbia basin project. They range from 54 to 142 irrigable acres in size and from \$1238 to \$2122 in price.

To qualify, a veteran must have served honorably for 90 days or more in the armed forces between September 16, 1940, and July 3, 1952, must have had at least two years of farming experience and must have \$4500 in net assets.

Application blanks are available from the Oregon veterans' department, from county service officers, or by writing the Bureau of Reclamation at Ephrata. The bureau has said it expects to issue two additional announcements soon for Columbia basin lands. Veterans who want these future announcements should write the bureau at Ephrata and ask to be placed on the mailing list.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—The University of Oregon school of journalism and the Oregon Newspaper Publisher's Association will act as co-sponsors of the 34th annual Oregon Press Conference when it convenes on the university campus February 20-21.
