WHAT girl doesn't long to have a St. Valentine's party? It's fun and so easy for the young miss who likes to do things "all by herself." A centerpiece of roses is appropriate and a few of these lovely flowers can be arranged to advantage, so the expense is small. Heart-decorated paper plates and napkins to match add the motif of the day to the table or buffet.

Home-made cookies, heart-shaped, and decorated, are festive and a box of cookie-mix provides a sufficient number with no great amount of effort. With the cookies an ice cream soda made with pale dry ginger ale is perfect. For a simpler drink,

ginger ale, thoroughly chilled, is good, or it can be mixed, in equal proportions, with any fruit juice. The frozen fruit juice concentrates are fine for mixing with ginger ale.

Here is a soda, sure to delight the youngsters, the recipe for a single drink.

GREEN MOUNTAIN SPECIAL
2 tablespoons maple syrup
Few drops maple flavoring
1 scoop vanilla ice cream
Pale dry ginger ale
Combine maple syrup and maple flavoring in a tall glass. Add vanilla ice cream. Fill glass with ice cold pale dry ginger ale. Stir gently to mix.
