Miss Leta Humphrey drove to Portland the last of the week to spend several days on business and pleasure.

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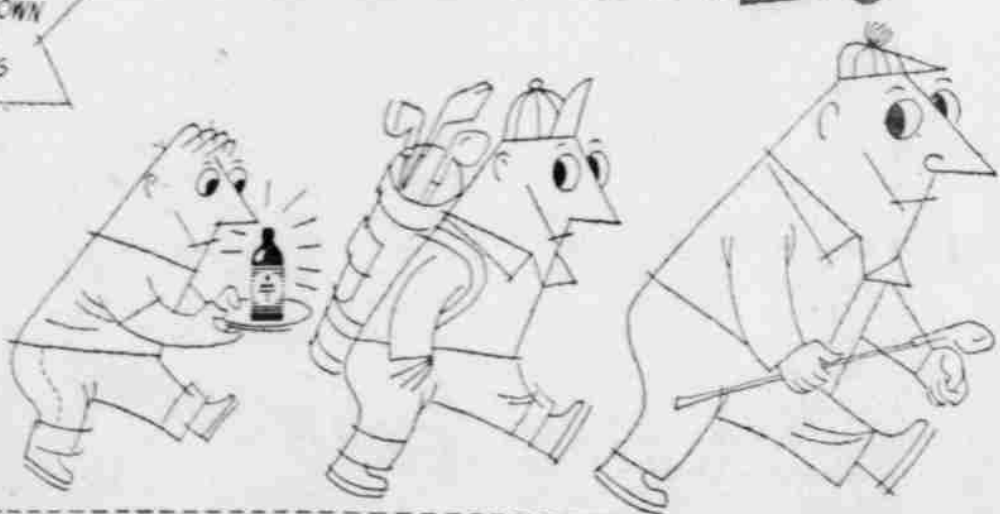
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
