

Cattle Price, Volume Down at Hermiston

Floyd Jones and R. B. Ferguson of Heppner and J. B. Gow of Cecil were among the people from the Heppner area attending the Hermiston Livestock Auction on Friday, according to Delbert Anson, manager of the sale.

Jones bought a cow and a calf. Ferguson sold four head of cattle. Gow consigned a calf.

Prices at Hermiston Friday were unevenly lower, in line with other markets, and volume was down, reflecting weather conditions.

Ralph Skoubo of Boardman sold two hogs that topped the market at \$23.80 cwt. They weighed 430 lbs each. The price was 30 cents above the Portland top. Don Bellamy of Hermiston sold a 300 lb. sow for \$21.60. A teen-ager, Peter Edmiston of Hermiston sold the top steer, weighing 830 lbs. for \$22. Orval Sherlock of Milton and J. E. Lieuallen of Weston each sold a bull at the top price for the day of \$19.30. Sherlock's bull weighed 1460 lbs. and Lieuallen's weighed 1505. Clyde Nobles of Hermiston consigned the top baby calf, a whiteface that sold for \$27.

Weight Check Shows Heavy Cattle Gain On F. F. A. Projects

The F. F. A. Trailer scales made its rounds again this month to weigh beef animals on feed by the members of the local chapter. During the past month the bulls fed by Allen Hughes out-gained all others, as all three of his animals gained better than three pounds a day for an average of 3.5 pounds. His best bull gained 3.8 pounds per day.

The fastest gaining steer was fed by Neil Beamer. It gained an average of 2.8 pounds per day.

James Allen, local F. F. A. advisor stated that the chapter would be glad to make the scales available to any farmer or 4-H members wishing to weigh their cattle.
