Temperance Speaker Due At Christian

Special speaker at the Heppner Christian church next Sunday will be Dr. Titus A. Frazee, a fellow of the Yale university school of alcohol studies and executive director of Oregon Temperance league, the inter church temperance movement.

Dr. Frazee is nationally known as an authority on alcohol problems and is in constant demand as a speaker for both youth and adults on a wide variety of subjects.

Early in 1936 Dr. Frazee began his interdenominational ministry and during the following 16 years he has made a major contribution in the field of religion by initiating streamlined techniques in his field. He is quite active in Portland and northwest civic and religious activities.

Evangelist Due At Lexington Church

Rev. Arthur W. Allen, pastor evangelist, will be the guest speaker at the Christian and Congregational Church in Lexington for their week of pre-Easter services, March 30 through April 5. Mr. Allen has in the past been associated with the Youth for Christ as a regional director and in that capacity toured Europe in a preaching ministry. Mr. Allen is a graduate of Northwestern Schools of Minneapolis and has had a fruitful ministry in the churches of Montana and Wyoming. He has just returned from an extensive tour of the Holy Land visiting Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, the new nation of Israel and many countries in

Europe.

A feature of the week of services will be an illustrated lecture on the subject, "A Nation Reborn". Mr. Allen will use Kodachrome movies and slides he has taken on his trip and will speak of the prophecies of the Bible as they bear on the progress of the Jews in establishing a home in their Promised Land. The public is invited to attend these services which begin each evening at eight o'clock from Monday on through Easter Sunday.
