It should be fun choosing your Easter bonnet this year, for hat styles have never been prettier or more flattering. There are profiles, flat bonnets, picture cartwheels, cloches—you just can't miss finding one you'll love to parade in.

All cheese should be stored in the refrigerator, but not too near the freezing coils. It should be wrapped in waxed paper and placed in a covered container to prevent drying out.

A salad to perk up tired winter appetites is this one: On hearts of lettuce serve a dressing made of 8 anchovy filets mashed with a little of their oil, 1 tsp. each finely chopped scallions, minced parsley and 2 tsp. minced chives, 1½ tsp. tarragon vinegar and 2 cups real mayonnaise. Blend all ingredients. A scrumptious dressing for sea food, too.

Simple Oat Cookies will do any cookie jar proud. Make them this way: Combine 3 cups quick oats, ¾ cup vitaminized margarine, ¾ cup sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Blend well with fingers. Shape into small balls and place on a greased baking sheet. Dip fork into cold water and flatten balls crosswise. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 15 minutes. Yields about 40 cookies.

SEVERAL TRIAL FIELDS OF GRAZING ALFALFA SEEDED IN COUNTY

Trials comparing five different strains of alfalfa have been seeded on 265 acres here during the past six weeks, reports N. C. Anderson, Morrow County Agent. Seedings were made on the ranches of Delbert Emert and Oscar Peterson, Ione; Bill Padberg, Kenneth Peck and A. C. Lindsay, Lexington. Seedings are yet to be made on 35 acres at the W. E. Hughes and Ralph Justus ranches, Heppner.

These trials are sponsored by the Morrow County Livestock-growers Association as a means for comparing adaptability of five strains of alfalfa for dryland seeding. They were seeded with various dryland grasses. Grasses used were crested wheatgrass, Sherman big bluegrass, Whitmar beardless wheatgrass, and pubescent wheatgrass. Five pounds of grass were seeded with one pound of alfalfa per acre. The alfalfas used were seeded separately in each of the fields so that exact observations can be made.

Alfalfas seeded were: Nomad, Sevelra, Rhizoma, Ladak and Ranger. All but the last variety named, show dryland grazing characteristics. Nomad, a creeping variety developed by Burlington Seed Company, is a superior alfalfa for dryland pasture. It has the ability to make a new crown anywhere on the root, so stands gopher damage and heavy grazing. Sevelra originated at the TL Ranch in Idaho. It is the field cross of Grimm, Orenberg and Semipalatinsk; looks promising for dryland pasture. Rhizoma, originating in Canada, is supposed to have much the same characteristics as Nomad. Ladak is the old standard from Maine to Washington. It is variegated from Grimm, more leafy, more hardy, good seedling vigor. Ranger, a synthetic made of Cossack, Ladak, Orestan and two others like Orestan; dependable high yield, wilt resistance and hardiness. It is being used as a check in these trial seedings.

Plans are now being made for a field day, late this spring, to observe these and other range and pasture seedings. It will be sponsored by the Range and Pasture Improvement Committee of which Steve Thompson, Heppner, is chairman.

More Washington Farms Open To Vets

Twenty full-time farm units in the Columbia Irrigation project in Washington are currently offered for sale by the government, with World War II veterans given priority. Vere McCarty, service officer for the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported today. Priority applications must be filed by April 3 with the office

of the Bureau of Reclamation, Ephrata, Washington, to be included in the public drawing. Veterans' military service must have been between September 16, 1940, and July 3, 1952.

The current opening, listed as public announcement No. 13, comprises 20 farm units ranging in size from 40 to 102 irrigable acres, and in price from \$1913 to \$5344. All but two of the 20 farms are being used to produce dry-farmed grain, so carry a higher value than the two which still have their natural cover of sagebrush and grass.

The farms are located in the south-central part of the Columbia basin project in Franklin county, from 12 to 14 miles southwest of the town of Connell. Grand Coulee dam, key structure of the project, is 110 miles to the north.

To qualify, an applicant must have had at least two years of farming experience, must expect to engage in farming as an occupation, and must possess assets worth at least \$4500 in excess of liabilities.

Application blanks are available from the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, from county service officers, or from the Bureau of Reclamation at Ephrata, Washington.

State Traffic Deaths Drop During February

Oregon traffic fatalities last month receded to 20 from the 33 recorded in January of this year, a preliminary count reported by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reveals.

The February death toll, which may go higher if delayed fatality reports are received, brought the number of 1953 traffic deaths to 53. The count was 49 last year at the same time.

Newbry said February normally produces relatively fewer traffic deaths each year because the month is shorter and motor vehicle travel is comparatively light.
