HOW TO MAKE Springtime Turkey and Cranberry Sauce

Everything is new and light and fresh in spring and so is this sparkingly fresh, new, light way to serve Turkey and Cranberry Sauce perfectly tuned to the season.

Step 1. Open one 1-lb. can either jellied or whole cranberry sauce. Put one large happy sun-ripened orange through food chopper (rind and pulp).

Step 2. Mix thoroughly the ruby-red cranberry sauce and chopped orange. Cover dish and chill to blend flavors. Makes delicious cranberry-orange relish—perfect partner to springtime turkey.

Step 3. Stuff your family-sized turkey (they come in sizes from 4 or 5 lbs. up) with a whole fresh pineapple to give a springtime touch! Select a ripe fresh pineapple and pare lengthwise. Roll in sugar and place in turkey cavity!

Step 4. For even browning, cover turkey with cheesecloth dipped in melted fat. Press cloth around bird snugly and roast according to standard time for weight of bird. During last 10 minutes of roasting, remove cheesecloth to allow extra browning.

4-H Club Livestock Contest Winners Announced by Agent

Betty Stellmacher, 18, Albany, has won the 1952 \$100 college scholarship that Safeway Stores presents to the winner of the statewide 4-H livestock breeding project, according to Cal Monroe, state 4-H club agent.

First alternate for the college scholarship is Terrell McKenzie of Coburg and second alternate is Cecil DeLong, La Grande.

Only club members who placed first in their county last year in this contest and have the highest-scoring livestock breeding project in their respective county this year were eligible.

Betty has been livestock club leader in her community for the past two years. She began her livestock project in 1945 with a Romney ewe and lamb. Since that time she has bought two more Romney ewe lambs, nine Southdown ewes, a Southdown ram, and has raised 17 ewe lambs. She has also sold 10 ram lambs for breeding purposes and fed out a number of fat lambs for market. She plans to increase her flock to 52 head of sheep and to continue her 4-H club work as a

member and leader.

At the present time Betty is a freshman at Oregon State college and pays her expenses with the money she earned from her sheep project.

Scholarships for the 4-H summer school held at Oregon State college also awarded to 6 girls and 10 boys who had the top livestock breeding projects in their respective counties. These winners can compete for the state award next year.
