

Crozier Services Draw Many Persons From Lexington

Funeral services were held Friday at the Trinity Lutheran church in Hermiston for Doris and David Crozier who met death on Monday night at their home near Hermiston.

Doris was born July 26, 1917 in Pendleton and David was born May 21, 1918 in Idaho. Officiating at the service was Rev. Armin Reitz of their local church with music by the church choir group accompanied by Mrs. Reitz at the organ. Burial was in the beautiful Hermiston cemetery where they were laid to rest side by side. They were married about seven years and had one son Stephen 4 and Mr. Crozier a son, David (Chip) by an early marriage.

Doris was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Klingner, of Hermiston. She was raised on their ranch near Lexington and attended school in the grade school for years at the Alpine school later coming to Lexington where she finished her high school, graduating from here with the class of 1935. She leaves a host of friends and some school mates who still reside near here. Crozier left 7 sisters and three brothers to mourn his passing and all were present for the services, from various parts of Oregon, Washington and California. He was a returned veteran and was buried

with full military honors. Several years ago they lived near Lexington on a ranch at which time their son David was a member of the third grade.

Spring Cleanup: Time to Get Rid of Rats

With little extra effort you can rid your farm of rats and mice while you do your regular spring clean up. This 1-2-3 plan, using warfarin bait, enables you to reduce the rat and mouse population to a minimum, and then keep it there.

Spring cleanup time is an ideal time to bring rats and mice under control, according to pest control specialists.

For best results, they recommend this three-point program: One—Remedy poor sanitation. Two—Ratproof buildings. Three—Place rat bait according to directions.

Good sanitation demands the removal of rubbish piles of all kinds, because they afford protection for hiding and underground breeding. Lumber and firewood should be piled on racks at least one foot from the ground—never directly on the ground. Insofar as possible, feed of all kinds should be protected.

Corn cribs, granaries, cellars, homes, warehouses, and other buildings should be ratproofed to keep the rats out. Bulletins which describe ratproofing methods may be obtained from the local health officer or county agent.

Baiting is the third and most effective blow in the Spring anti-rat campaign. Outstanding among the available poisons is warfarin,

a powerful substance discovered in the laboratories of Dr. Karl Paul Link, Biochemistry Dept., University of Wisconsin, by Drs. Mark A. Stahmann, Miyoshi Ikawa, and Link. Warfarin bait is highly recommended because:

It kills both rats and mice; the potency of the poison is consistent; it is a slow killer, and does not cause "bait shyness"; rodents do not develop a tolerance for warfarin; it may be purchased as a concentrate or as ready-mixed bait; and warfarin is relatively safe to use.

In using warfarin bait, it is important that it be made available to the rodents at all times. Bait stations—shallow containers protected with a board or a wooden box—are normally examined and replenished at least every 48 hours. A limited number of permanent bait stations may be used to kill newcomers and control re-invasion.

Recommendations Made in College Crop Bulletin

Recommendations are made for the crop varieties best adapted to each of Oregon's crop regions in a new bulletin released by the Oregon State college experiment station. The varieties recommended have been tested by the farm crops staff at OSC and by the branch experiment stations.

The bulletin covers the major varieties of the cereal crops, flax, and forage seed crops.

To simplify the crop-variety recommendations, the state is divided into seven district crop regions or zones in the bulletin. The divisions are Coast, Willamette Valley, Southern Oregon, Columbia Basin, Blue Mountains, Central Oregon, and the Snake River Valley.

The publication explains that within each of the crop zones there may be enough variation in other conditions, such as soil types of fertility, to modify the general recommendations. Soil moisture and type or extremes of acidity or alkalinity and also irrigation may often cause modifications of the crop recommendations.

Descriptions are given of the varieties recommended and the publication suggests that information on crops and crop varieties for special conditions within any zone is available from the county agent. Copies of "1953 Field Crop Recommendations for Oregon," can be obtained at the county extension office or from OSC.
