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## OSC Issues Circular On Beef Improvement

A program for the commercial beef producer who wants continued efficient and economical production of beef is given in a new circular of the Oregon State college extension service.

James Elings, animal husbandry specialist at OSC who is author of the circular, says the program is aimed at producing more pounds of calf per cow and cutting overhead expenses.

The circular lists five main points for a range beef improvement program. The points are: use of good type range bulls; culling the herd; selection of replacement heifers; use of a good year-round nutrition program; and controlling diseases and parasites.

Recommendations are given in the publication for operations best done during the various seasons. Other points considered include individual cow identification; calf dehorning and bull castration; and the value of adequate scales and records. In addition, examples are given of herd, feed and disease and parasite control records.

Copies of the circular, "Developing a Practical Range Beef Improvement Program are available from county extension offices and OSC.
