Beef Makes Strong Bid on U. S. Menu As Prices Decline

Beef will soon make its strongest bid on the American menu in more than 40 years with retail prices dropping sharply and the largest number of cattle in history backed up on farms, say agricultural economists at Oregon State College.

Retail price declines since the first of the year already have stepped up buying as home-makers take advantage of the best opportunity in several years to satisfy the family's beef appetite.

In spite of increased consumption, the largest number of cattle on record assure a good supply for several years, according to the economists. They add that under normal conditions the supply of beef is likely to increase for at least another two or three years.

Beef is now running well ahead of pork in the total red meat supply. Recent estimates by the U. S. department of agriculture point out that beef consumption in the nation this year is expected to exceed that of pork by the largest margin since 1918.

Falling beef prices and smaller supplies of pork indicate that the average consumer may have seven pounds more beef in 1953—68 pounds of beef, or more compared with 61 pounds of pork per person. This is a complete reversal of the 1952 picture when the average consumer ate about 61 pounds of beef in terms of wholesale carcass weight and 72 pounds of pork.

At least 15 percent more beef will be produced in 1953 than last year, and consumption could go higher than now predicted if dry weather or other unfavorable

conditions should force heavy marketing of cattle. The pork supply is likely to be about 12 to 15 percent lower than last year.

Economists say veal will also be more plentiful this year and consumption may increase from the seven pounds last year to eight pounds or more. Lamb and mutton are expected to hold nearly steady at around four pounds.
