

## Mustang Track Team Sinks Grant Union

The Heppner high school track team rolled over Grant Union of John Day 94-31 in a dual meet here Friday in what was practically a field day for coach Steve Trukositz's boys as Grant Union only took two firsts, one in the shot put and another in the relays.

Leading the Heppner cinder-men in their victory was Wendell Connor with a total of 26 points. He had firsts in the broadjump, low hurdles, 220 yd dash and the 100 yd dash, along with seconds in the high hurdles and javelin and a third in the pole vault.

Bill Hughes garnered 15 points on firsts in pole vault, high jump, and discus. Jerry Haguewood was close behind with wins in the 880 and the javelin and a second in the high jump. He ran the 880 in 2:12.1 to set a new school record.

Jim Green had 8 points, with a first in the high hurdles and a second in the lows. Distance runner Bud Harshman had 6 points as he took his usual first in the mile and third in the 880 and the pole vault. Roland Taylor chalked up a victory in the 440 yd dash for a total of 5 points; Lyle Jensen a second in the discus; Skip Ruhl a second in the 440 and Mike Monahan second in the mile. John Mollahan took third in the shot put. The Heppner relay team accounted for the rest of the Mustang points.

The Mustangs scored once in the top of the first, only to have Stanfield score 2 in their half and 3 more in the second to gain a 5-1 lead. In the fourth, Heppner scored 3 runs, sending the starting Stanfield hurler, Sutton, to the showers. Heppner scored off the relief hurler in the fifth to tie the score and then went ahead in the sixth, 6-5. Heppner pitcher, Dick Kononen, who had pitched an excellent game for the Mustangs was taken out by coach Steve Trukositz in the seventh after allowing men to get on second and third with only one out. Reserve pitcher, Bill Hughes struck out the next man and got 2 strikes on the third man only to have him bang out a single which sent in two runs to end the game.

Heppner will meet the Irrigon Comets on the local field Thursday with the game scheduled to start at 3 o'clock. Starting pitcher will probably be Hughes with Lyle Jensen in reserve.
