4-H CLUB NEWS

Mrs. Rieta Piper, Morrow County chairman of the International Farm Youth Exchange program, reports \$128 taken in at the square dance held at Ione last Saturday night. The dance, sponsored by the Morrow County 4-H Club Council, was a means of raising funds for promoting the I. F. Y. E. movement, which is held in Oregon by 4-H Clubs. Proceeds of the dance, after expenses are paid, will be used for that purpose.

The purpose of the I. F. Y. E. program is to promote peace between nations by developing understanding and friendship among people. Oregon will receive ten of these exchanges this summer. This is twice as many as we send to other countries. Oregon has two in Brazil and Bolivia this winter, and will have students going to Switzerland, Norway and France this summer.

Applications are being taken now for exchangees to stay on different farms and ranches in Oregon. Exchangees live with each farm family from four to six weeks. While living with the family, they are expected to work for their room and board and a small allowance. Farm families having young persons living at home will receive preference.
