

Mustangs Win From Irrigon Nine, 12 to 11

The Heppler Mustang baseball team eked out a 12-11 victory over the visiting Irrigon high school Comets on the local rodeo field Thursday. Credited with the victory was pitcher Bill Hughes, who went the distance for Heppler.

The game was filled with errors by both squads, as not one of the 23 runs was an earned run. Although the Mustangs looked poor on defense, they showed much better batting than in the previous games.

The first inning was uneventful, with neither team scoring. Heppler broke loose in the bottom of the second however, to score 8 runs. Neither team scored in the third, but in the top of the fourth, the Comets scored six runs to make the tally 8-6. Heppler came back in the bottom of the fourth to score two more runs and make the score 10-6, only to have Irrigon tie it up in the fifth inning. Heppler

gained the lead again in the bottom of the sixth, scoring two runs, and Irrigon could pick only one of the needed two runs in the seventh.

The Heppler high school cindermen dropped a dual meet to a very strong Hermiston high school squad by a score of 82-34 Monday. The Mustangs showed up fairly well in the track events, but placed in only two field events.

Wendell Connor led in point

making for Heppler with 11, taking first place in the high hurdles and second in the broad jump and 100 yard dash. Bud Harshman had 8 points with a first in the mile and second in the 880 yd run. Bill Hughes also racked up a first for Heppler, taking the pole vault. Freshman distant runner, Mike Monahan took second in the mile, Jim Green second in the high hurdles and Skip Ruhl second in the 440. Roland Taylor took third place in the 440. Jerry Hagueswood, Mustang half miler failed to run because of a pulled muscle, but he should be ready to go to the district meet.

Next outing for Heppler will be the district meet at La Grande Saturday. Boys placing first or second in this meet will participate in the state meet at Corvallis the following weekend.

Heppler Ponies Win County Grade School Trackmeet

The Heppler grade school Ponies captured 15 first place events in the annual Morrow county track meet held here May 1. Four records fell with Jerry Doherty, Heppler breaking two. He won the pole vault at 9'2" and threw the discus 114'. Ed Olson took the honors in the 300 yard dash, running the event in 37.4 seconds, two seconds better than the previous record.

Harry Harris gave the baseball a ride of 253'9" to get his name in the record book and 7th grader Jim Morris broke the discus record with a throw in the class B event 70'7".
