Information Available**

If you are hired for full-time on a farm and meet the \$50 test of regular employment, you should get social credit for your farm work. You know whether you are eligible for this social security credit for your farm work? If you are sure, check with your employer or contact your local social security office for more information. The Social Security Administration will give you a statement of your social security record if you ask for it. Check up! Are your records accurate? Are your records right? Are your records cash in your future, the way you recommend.

The Social Security Administration in La Grande maintains a contact station in the city hall at 10 a. m. on Thursday following the bird Tuesday of each month. A field representative from the La Grande social security office will be at the Heppner contact station on Thursday, May 21st, from 10 a. m. until noon.

**72 Idaho Farm Units
Open To Veterans**

War Veterans are offered priority in acquiring 72 farm units being opened to homestead entry in southern Idaho, it was announced this week by Vern A. McCarty, Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs service officer.

Veterans' applications must be filed with the Bureau of Reclamation, 11th and E Streets, Rupert, Idaho, by July 20 to qualify for the public drawing to determine the winners.

The 72 farm units cover 7,289 irrigable acres in the Minidoka irrigation project and are situated about 40 miles east of Twin Falls in Minidoka and Jerome counties of southern Idaho. The units go free to qualified successful applicants.

Veterans must have had 90 days or more of honorable service between Sept. 16, 1940, and July 3, 1952. They must have had farming experience and must own assets worth at least \$4500 above their liabilities.

Meantime, veterans still have until May 14 to apply for a chance to purchase one of the 108 full-time farm units offered by the reclamation bureau north of Pasco in the Columbia basin irrigation project in Washington. Applications for this offering should be mailed to the Bureau of Reclamation, Ephrata, Washington.

Application forms will be available from the Oregon Veterans' department in Salem and Portland, from county veterans' service officers, or by writing to the appropriate reclamation bureau offices.

**State Traffic Deaths
Exceed Year Ago**

Oregon traffic smash-ups have killed 113 persons so far this year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry said Friday.

A breakdown by month shows January with 35 deaths, February 23; March, 27; and April, 28. Newbry said the April figure may still go higher if delayed reports are received, or if persons injured in accidents succumb.

The four month toll exceeds that record for the corresponding period last year, when 106 fatalities were reported.

On the basis of these figures Newbry said he has called on the state traffic safety division to "exert all possible efforts during the summer months to help hold accidents to a minimum".

Safety officials said they plan an intensive campaign to familiarize out-of-state vacationists with Oregon roads and traffic laws and hope to make special appeals to Oregon drivers for increased courtesy, attention and patience behind the wheel.

Most accidents, the division said, could be prevented by common sense courtesy and alertness when driving. The division also figures that some drivers become too relaxed on vacations or Sunday drives, allowing their minds and their eyes to stray from the highway.

Other suggestions for cutting the traffic death toll included: avoid crowding too many miles into a day's drive, abstain from drinking and driving, and stop frequently while on long trips to break the monotony of driving.

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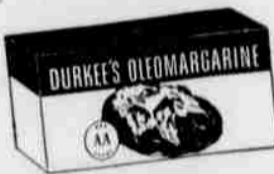
