Turning Cause of Many Traffic Crashes

Watch those turning movements, was the word to Oregon drivers from the state traffic safety division today after a check of 1952 accident records.

The division said attempting a right or left turn led to 14,380 accidents last year, leading all other driving maneuvers in production of accidents involving two or more cars.

Running a close second were rear-end collisions numbering 13,808 in 1952.

These collision types, the division said, usually result from misjudging the speed and distance of approaching vehicles and following too closely. Though comparatively non-severe, they were fatal 18 times last year and even apparently minor body damage can require costly repairs, the division pointed out.

Drivers were urged to check traffic behind as well as ahead of their cars before turning off an arterial roadway and to make certain they are in the proper lane before turning at an intersection.

Lodgepole Pine Shows Promise For Hardboard Use

Oregon's lodgepole pine forests may become a promising new source of raw material for dry-formed hardboards.

Gaylord D. Nixon, wood technologist at the Oregon Forests Products laboratory, said this would find a use for more than 80 percent of Oregon's lodgepole pine stands. Most of the trees range from six to ten inches in diameter.

Some eastern Oregon communities located near large stands of lodgepole pine have become concerned with the effects on industrial employment of diminishing saw-timber supplies of other species.

Research on this problem at the state forest research center, which is located on the Oregon State college campus, was limited to laboratory-scale hardboard experiments.

Lodgepole pine chips which has been steamed before grinding produced a fiber which made stronger boards than did fiber

ground from raw, green chips. It was found. The steamed fiber appeared to make the most efficient use of a wax emulsion added for improved water resistance.

No major use for lodgepole pine has been found due to its limited size. The annual volume cut for all present uses does not balance the annual growth.

Oregon has some 620 million board feet of lodgepole saw-timber. The total volume, including the hardboard-type sizes, would be several times this amount.

The strength, hardness and density of lodgepole pine lumber are comparable to these same properties in ponderosa pine. It is easily machined, glued and painted. The sapwood is nearly white, while the heartwood is only slightly darker.

New Project Record Set by 4-H Members

The highest percentage in 11 years of project completions was attained last year by Oregon 4-H club members, according to Burton Hutton, state 4-H leader. Club members carried 34,033 projects and completed more than 82 percent. Morrow county's 209 members carried 287 projects and completed 96 percent.

Hutton said 4-H club work in Oregon last year stepped up in many departments and the number of members increased to 25,026. He added that quality of work by the club members also ran "exceptionally high". Judges of last year's county and state 4-H club exhibits reported that in many instances it was the highest type of work they had ever judged.

In 1953, the Oregon 4-H club program will give special attention to improved services to adult volunteer 4-H club leaders, the organization of a junior leadership project and the improving and revising of 4-H literature.

Hutton reported mounting interest on the part of local volunteer leaders. "Everywhere, we find the same story—keen interest, folks enjoying their experiences as leaders and looking forward to the 4-H activities of their club and communities."
