From The County Agent's Office

Here are several dates that you want to mark down on your calendar. First, the Western Livestock Journal beef cattle tour will visit Morrow county on Saturday, June 6. There agenda calls for a stop at the Floyd Worden ranch at 9:00 a. m.; at the Frank Anderson ranch at 10:30; at the Kirk and Robinson ranch at 1:30; and at the Delbert Emert ranch 3:30. These ranchers are doing a good job with their pure bred herds, and I am sure that everyone will want to join the tour for the day.

Other events are the Wheat League 4-H and FFA fat stock show and sale, which will be held at The Dalles on June 8, 9, 10; the Eastern Oregon Branch Experiment Station Feeders Day at Union on June 15; the Pendleton Branch Experiment Station field day on the Crow Pilot farm on June 16; Pendleton Branch Experiment Station field day on Lester King Pilot farm on June 26; the annual field day at the Sherman Branch Experiment Station at Moro will be held at 1:30 p. m. on July 7; the Umatilla Branch Experiment Station field day held annually at Hermiston is scheduled for July 10, this year.

If you are interested in seeing how range improvements can be worked out on private and federal land in Bend on June 12 and 13. On those days the Pacific Northwest Section of the American Society of Range Management will sponsor a field tour of the livestock area around Madras, Redmond, Prineville, and Bend. The two day tour will include seeing developments in range and skid road seedings, meadow and water improvements, brush control, seed bed preparation, different systems of grazing management, and other phases of range rehabilitation and improvement. Entertainment and fun are also to be included during the two day meeting, ranging from the Friday night banquet and traditional cowboy breakfast to a special ladies program. Headquarters for the tour will be the Pilot Butte Inn at Bend and the dates are June 12 and 13.

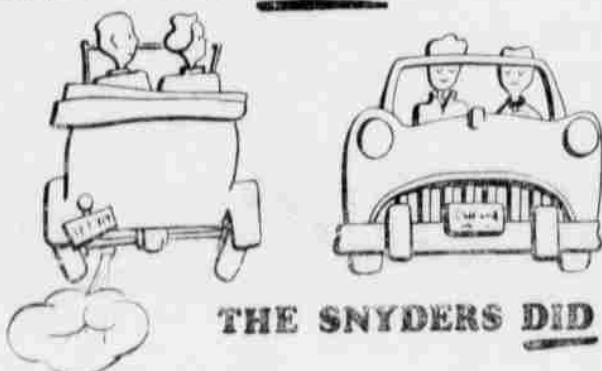
