This line and substation will feed everything south and west of Ukiah to Monument, Ore. If qualified bids are received at this bid letting, construction will be completed this fall.

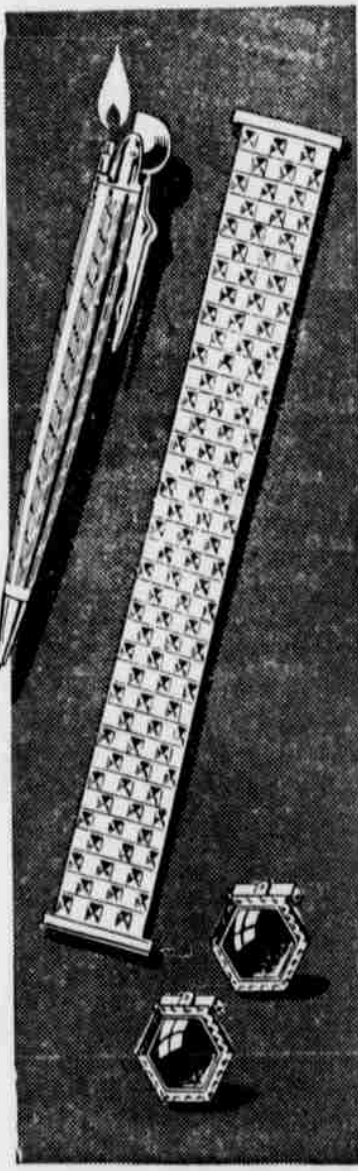
