

FARMERS ON UNSEEDED LAND URGED TO APPLY FOR WHEAT ALLOTMENT

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for any of the 1951, 1952 or 1953 crop years may apply for a 1954 wheat acreage allotment, according to Harold Campbell, chairman of the Morrow County Production & Marketing Administration committee.

To be considered for an allot-

ment, a farm which had no wheat seeded for any of the above years, the farmer must apply at the county PMA office not later than June 30, 1953.

Blank application forms are available at the county PMA office in the First National Bank building for use in filing requests for allotments.

Mr. and Mrs. Claude Graham had as their guests last weekend his brother Wilo Graham and daughter Marjorie of Vancouver, Washington.

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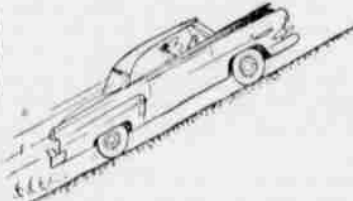
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
