COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Court Proceedings for the Month of June, 1953.
The minutes of the May term were read and approved.

Morrow County entered into an agreement with Darrell D. Coppock for the right and privilege of a roadway at least 24 feet in width, from the County rock crusher site on land owned by H. S. Murray to the County road running North and South.
The Court granted a Dance Hall License to the Irrigon Grange No. 935.

The Court ordered the following Bangs' disease claims paid: Louis A. Bergevin, \$56.00; Thomas P. Michos, \$8.00; and W. Howard Cleveland, \$16.00.

The Court ordered that an election be held in the Heppner Cemetery Maintenance District upon the 10th day of July, 1953 for the election of three directors.

Harold Dobyns was appointed trapper for the year 1953-54 at a salary of \$100.00.

The petition of D. W. Ewing and others of Boardman, Oregon to narrow Heppner Street in Ewing Addition to the City of Boardman was denied.

The Court ordered that the amount of \$2,909.52 in the Alcohol Control Fund be and is transferred to the General Fund of the County, to be used for Mother's Aid, Old Age Pensions and Relief of the Indigent.

The Court ordered that the amount of \$310.16 in the Amusement Device Tax Fund be and is transferred to the General Fund to be used for Old Age Assistance.

The Court ordered that the amount of \$19,703.82 in the Motor License Fund, which will not be used for the Bonds and Interest fund, transferred to the General Road Fund.

The Court ordered the establishment of a Law Library Fee and the County Clerk is ordered, authorized and directed to collect in each civil suit, action or proceedings filed in either the Circuit Court or the County Court, in the manner in which other fees are collected therein in addition to the fees provided by law, and as library fee, an additional sum equivalent to 20 percent of said filing fee. To be in effect on and after July 1, 1953.

The Court hereby ordered that the Clerk transfer from the Emergency Appropriation to the various appropriations mentioned above, the amounts as set forth

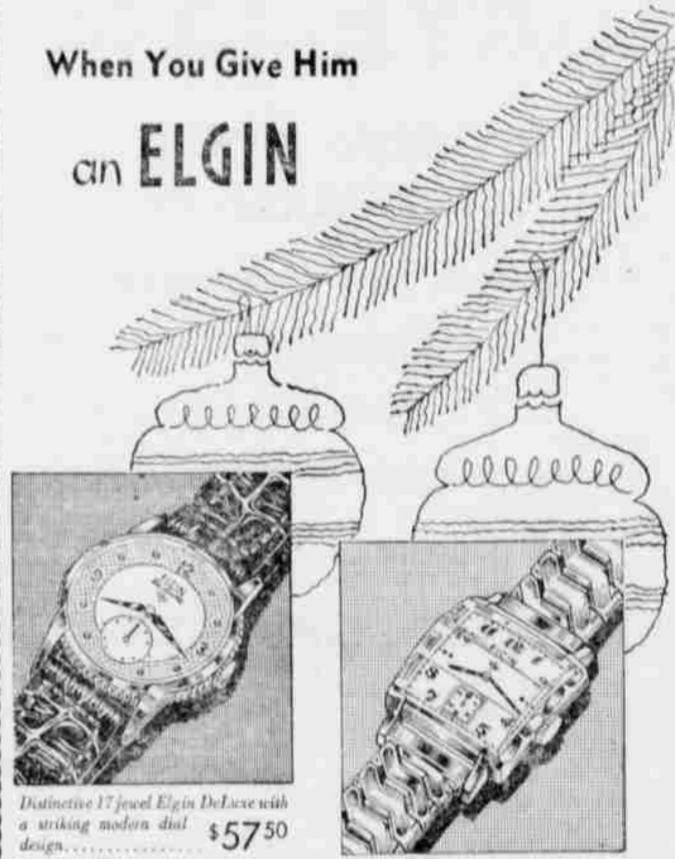
and that he adjust his books to show the transfer.

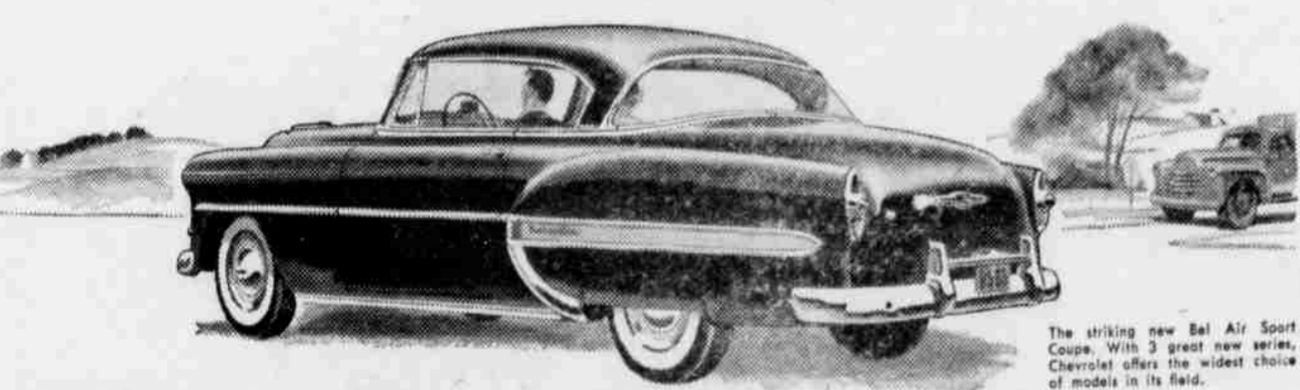
