

### John Pruter Rites Held At Boardman Saturday, July 11

BOARDMAN—The funeral services of John Pruter were held at the Boardman Community church Saturday afternoon 2 p. m. July 11, 1953, with the Rev. Henry Schulze, Hermiston, officiating. Soloist was Mrs. Thurman Johnson who sang "The Old Rugged Cross" and "God Will Take Care

of You", accompanied by Mrs. Fred Smith. Pallbearers were Charles Anderegg, Charles Dillon, Ray Brown, Henry Zivney, Earl Cramer and Walter Hayes. Burial was in the Boardman Riverview cemetery.  
Mr. Pruter was born in Westside, Iowa, February 11, 1862, and was married to Vera Novack November 26, 1909. Mr. and Mrs. Pruter came to Boardman in 1919, and have since resided on the family farm four miles west of town, until some three years ago when they sold the farm due to age and ill health. For one year the Pruters lived in Kennewick, Wash., returning and since living in Boardman, where Mr. Pruter

died Tuesday July 7th at 8 p. m. Besides his widow Mr. Pruter leaves two brothers, Frank, Manning, Iowa, and Will, of Westside, Iowa, whom he was able to visit in 1952.
