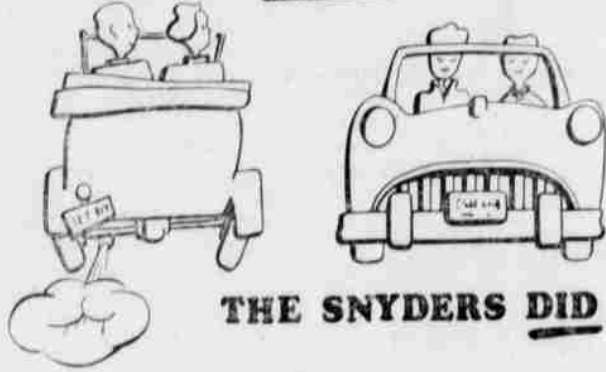
From The County Agent's Office

With the livestock market such as it is, the Farmers Home Administration last week announced an emergency livestock loan program. The loans are available to established producers and feeders of cattle sheep and goats. They are available to operators who have a reasonable chance to succeed and have been

unable to obtain needed credit from other sources to continue their normal operations. Application forms can be obtained at any county office of Farmers Home Administration. The office handling Morrow county loans is located at La Grande, Eugene M. Deny, Box 886, La Grande, is the supervisor.

Wool Growers Sale Offers Choice Rams

Donald Cameron, Pendleton, chairman of the ram sale committee for the Oregon Wool Growers association reports that 270 selected rams will be offered at the 27th annual sale here August 17.

Many of our farmers were pleasantly surprised with the outcome of the vote last week on marketing quotas. Marketing quotas passed by an 87 percent vote, nationally. In Morrow county, 463 operators voted for marketing quotas, nine against.

Our county had one of the highest votes in the state with the exception of Umatilla county. With marketing quotas passing wheat farmers will be assured of support prices of 90% of parity, if they stay within their acreage allotment.

With Fair time drawing near, it is time to be thinking of getting your entry blanks filled out and in to this office. "Sheepman will have an opportunity to get rams from some of the best breeders in the northwest," Cameron declared. Breeds represented include rambouillet, columbias, lincoln-rambouillet crossbreds, suffolks, and hampshires. The lincoln breed will not be represented because of lack of demand.

A new innovation this year gives small flock owners of sheep a chance to buy singles or pens of two or three.

Cooperative Member Relations Reviewed

Results of a survey of 43 Oregon farmer cooperative managers in 1951 and 1952 are given in experiment station bulletin 535 recently released by Oregon State college.

The publication summarizes what cooperative managers are doing to build and maintain favorable member attitudes. It

also summarizes and appraises the opinions of managers concerning which devices may be most effective in creating favorable attitudes among members.

Some of the important characteristics of a good manager are also listed and discussed briefly in the report.

Dr. Gerald E. Kozan, OSC agricultural economist, conducted the study and prepared the publication called, "Establishing and Maintaining Favorable Attitudes Among Cooperative Members."

Copies are available at county extension offices and from the bulletin clerk at Oregon State college.

Sheep-Beef Auction To Be Held by OSC

Registered beef and sheep from Oregon State college breeding stock will be auctioned August 20 at the OSC livestock pavilion according to Dr. Fred F. McKenzie, head of the animal husbandry department. The auction begins at 1 p. m. Bids will also be accepted by mail.

Five dwarf-free, registered yearling Hereford bulls top the auction list. Dr. McKenzie says the bulls have made rates of gain up to 100 percent above average—as high as 3¼ pounds gain per day.

Fifteen dwarf-free, registered Hereford cows and heifers have also been declared surplus to hold down the size of the breeding herd for genetic studies. Eleven of the animals are two-year-olds and yearlings, and two are dames of the herd's outstanding sires.
