Mahoney home Christian Church, sponsored by 30 minutes while you prepare the savory barbecue sauce, then bake the beans and sauce together about 11/2 to 2 hours. Add frankfurters to the casserole the last half hour of

Barbecued Beans 'n' Franks 1/4 cups California large dry limas

diced medium-sized onion minced clove garlic tablespoons olive oil (8 ounce) can tomato sauce cup brown sugar (packed) tablespoons lemon juice

teaspoon dry mustard 14 teaspoons salt teaspoon Worcestershire sauce tablespoons catsup

6 to 8 frankfurters Soak lima beans in 3 cups water 5 to 6 hours or overnight. Bring to boil then turn heat low and simmer about 30 minutes, adding additional hot water if necessary. Fry onion and garlic in olive oil until golden in color. Stir in tomato sauce, brown sugar, lemon juice, mustard, salt, Worcestershire sauce and catsup. Heat to boiling. Place drained beans in baking dish, pour hot sauce over them. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1½ hours, adding hot bean liquid if needed. Score frankfurters and press lightly into top furters and press lightly into top of sauce, spooning some of sauce over them. Bake 30 minutes longer.


