County Agent News... Continued From Page Two of their spendable income this year than they did last year. They are still spending about three times more than they were in the post-war years of 1947 when goods were scarce. A considerable part of the tendency to spend this year has been spurred by installment credits. Consumer credit outstanding at the end of July had reached the record amount of four and one-half billion dollars above July, 1952. Out of this four and one-half billion dollars increase, 4.4 billion dollars was due to installment credit. A sizeable part of this installment credit was on the sale of automobiles. Automobile sales during the first half of the year were nearly 30% higher than a year earlier. On the other hand, farmers are not sharing in the higher incomes. The soft spot here has put a damper on the strong points of the economy. Marketings have increased enough to take up the slack caused by sagging farm prices. As a result, farm sales during the first eight months of the year have averaged about 6% lower than the same period last year. This downward trend in the income of farm people, even in the face of the strong domestic demand, has caused a feeling of uncertainty to creep into the economy.
