Circular Gives Salt Treatment for Posts

Salt treatment for lengthening the life of green posts and poles—a method familiar in western Oregon for many years—is reviewed in an extension circular just published by Oregon State college. Widely used as a simple, inexpensive treatment, it is also hazardous through use of a deadly chemical in the preservative solution. Preparation of posts for treatment and results with various types of wood based on 25-year tests are discussed in the state. The premium list and rules will soon be available from county extension agents or Dr. Fote.

Hermiston to Host State Corn Show; Normal Yields Seen

Top Oregon corn growers in 4-H, FFA and open class will compete for yield, 10-ear exhibit and judging honors at the 12th annual state corn show at Hermiston, November 27 and 28. Dr. R. E. Fore, Oregon State college farm crops agronomist and chairman of the show, is predicting a good turnout and about normal yields despite a cool season that has delayed maturity of corn. Last year's show at Albany pinned the sweepstakes ribbon for hybrid yield on Harold Amidon, Ontario FFA member for 1731 bushels an acre. Eastern Oregon has topped the yield event in all but one year since 1939. Larry Faust, Canby, was the 1950 winner with 146 bushels. Cold weather during May and June slowed corn growth in both the Willamette valley and Malheur county. Hermiston, host area for the first time this year, apparently suffered least among Oregon's major corn producing areas.

Dr. C. A. Larsen, superintendent of the Umatilla branch experiment station at Hermiston and local chairman of this year's show, says irrigation and fertilizer on U. S. 13, a hybrid, have boosted Hermiston yields to among the best in the state. Dry falls, that last year reduced corn moisture content to 16 percent in the yield, permit early harvest. The annual show is supported by Oregon banks, the Grange, Farm Bureau, Farmers' Union and Oregon State college to improve quality and to increase the yield and production of corn in
