Plan Farm Storage For Fertilizers, Specialist Advises

Farm storage facilities for commercial fertilizer may soon be as important as the once traditional hay barn if supplies are to move smoothly from manufacturing plants and retail distributors, says Dr. T. L. Jackson, extension soils specialist at Oregon State college.

Increasing demands for major fertilizers which are manufactured and shipped on a year-around basis require home storage if farmers want assurance of supplies at the right time and at reasonable costs.

The soils specialist recommends dry storage with watertight walls, good roof and a floor that will not draw moisture. Cement floors which are easily cleaned are preferable, since wood that becomes impregnated with certain fertilizers is quite flammable.

If the floor is of cement, it is a good idea to store fertilizer on wooden platforms to reduce moisture absorption, leaving space between platforms to allow air circulation and safe working floor.

Platforms and wooden floors should be of sturdy construction to support the weight of anticipated future fertilizer needs, the specialist reports. Loading work can be reduced if the floor is the same height as the bed of trucks used for hauling to and from the storage. Another work-saver is a smooth floor to permit use of a hand truck.

A building that is accessible to trucks during rainy weather may save money, since best buys in fertilizer often come during the winter when retailers are trying to clear storage space, Jackson points out.

The building need not be high. Fertilizer should not be stored higher than seven or eight sacks to avoid extreme pressure on bottom sacks which can cause "settling up" and hardening of the fertilizer.

The building should not be airtight. Allow plenty of air circulation to keep fertilizer dry and prevent hardening.

Research Planned On Second-Growth Northwest Timber

Additional technical knowledge about the fast-growing, wide-ringed, second-growth timber species, especially Douglas fir, which will be the major Pacific Northwest lumber type in future years, will be made possible through a gift of \$7500 from the Research Institute of the Pacific Northwest.

The funds, which will be used to finance projects in the school of forestry at Oregon State college and the Oregon Forest Products laboratory, have been received by the Forestry Research foundation of which Herbert J. Cox of Eugene is president and Paul M. Dunn, dean of forestry at OSC, is secretary-treasurer.

The main timber resource of the Pacific Northwest in the past and at present has been its old-growth stands, largely Douglas fir in the 250-400 year old age classes, Dean Dunn explained in outlining the proposed program. In the future, he added, the industry will be largely dependent on second growth forests, still predominately Douglas fir but in age classes ranging from 50 to 120 years.

"Considerable technical knowledge is available relative to the quality, physical characteristics, strength, shrinkage, workability, weight and grading of the old-growth timber," Dean Dunn explained, "but unfortunately, the physical properties of the two types of timber are quite different. Relatively little is known about the fast-growing, wide-ringed material that is now being produced and which will be the major lumber type in years to come."

Management aspects of this problem have been recognized for

some time and an active committee of private and public foresters has prepared factual information dealing with recommended forest practices for second-growth Douglas fir stands, according to Dean Dunn. The funds now available will provide for studies to determine the physical characteristics of second-growth species and to correlate this knowledge with recommendations for the utilization of the species, he said.
