Bird Guzzlers Built In Morrow County

Eleven bird guzzlers have been constructed in Morrow county the past summer to make water available throughout the year for the birds and game in dry areas. John Ely, biologist for the State Game Commission, northeast region, with headquarters in Pendleton, reported today.

The guzzlers, which hold 250 gallons of water, consist of a square cement catch basin with a sloping ramp on one side. As the water recedes in the cistern, the birds move further down the ramp to water. A wood frame top, covered with sheet aluminum, catches and diverts the water into the basin.

Seven of the guzzlers have been built on the Charles Carlson ranch, two on the Al Bunch and two on the Paul Brown ranches. Experience in Umatilla county with these water basins show that

their use increases year after year, Ely said. A total of 22 guzzlers have been built there since 1949 and five each have been constructed in Sherman and Gilliam counties since 1951. This is the first year for guzzler construction in Morrow county.

The guzzlers, which cost about \$200 each, are built with Pittman-Robinson funds obtained from 10 per cent tax on firearms and ammunition.

Quail, pheasants, song birds, rabbits, dogs, cats and coyotes are among the birds and animals life utilizing the guzzlers.

Wildlife Leader Gives Pheasant Hunting Pointers

Pheasant hunters can save time and energy and make more certain of seeing their share of birds this year if, before the season opens, they get permission of landowners to hunt and also find out where pheasants are.

Art Elnarsen, fish and game research unit leader at Oregon State college, says that because of this year's cold and wet spring and the usual heavy loss of eggs and young birds from agricultural machinery, pheasant populations in most areas in the Willamette valley are spotty. Pheasant populations are considered normal in most of the rest of the state with some Eastern Oregon spots considered better than average.

The season opens October 24 in all but a few areas.

The increased amount of posted land need not bother the hunter if he will pay farmers the courtesy of asking for permission to hunt and then respecting the wishes of the owner concerning his property. Elnarsen states. A canvass made by the research unit at OSC showed that 85 per cent of Benton county farmers

would permit hunting on their land if asked for permission. Only 8 percent refused to allow hunting. This fact is general throughout the state.

The research leader suggests that after getting permission to hunt during the coming season, the location of ring-necks be checked. Best times are during the early morning before the hunter goes to work or in the late afternoon. Ditch banks, swales and fence rows are favorite haunts. Hunters in the Willamette valley would do well to

stick to the low ground, he says. It is especially important for hunters to be out during the first days of hunting season. Elnarsen points out. The ring-necked pheasant cock is probably the most wary of all game birds, and after a very short time flushing the bird becomes difficult without a good dog. The dog also reduces crippling loss.

Less difficulty in telling the difference between pheasant cocks and hens is expected this year because the late season is allowing more maturing.
