

Ione Win Over Stanfield Gives Cardinals Championship

District Playoff Against Union To Be at Ione

Ione's Cardinals nailed down the district B football championship last Friday when they overwhelmed the Stanfield eleven to the tune of 50 to 6. The game was played on the Ione field.

The win assured Ione the chance to meet Union in the state quarter finals on Saturday Nov. 14, even though Ione still has one more game to play this weekend against McEwan of Athena but the outcome of this game can not effect the Cardinals' standing in the district. The Union game will be played on the Ione field, as will this Friday's against Athena.

The Cardinals have racked up an impressive record, having won all their six games and have scored 212 points against only 19 for their opponents. Top team scorer is Duane Baker with 73 points to his credit.

Last Friday's game against Stanfield was another routine similar in style to several Ione has played this year. They had practically the run of the field and missed no chances to add points.

In the first quarter Lee Palmer ran 50 yards before being tagged down on the 2 yard line to set up the first score. Jerry Bristow carried over for the tally. This was followed in rapid succession with scoring plays by Baker and Palmer. Ekstrom started out the scoring in the second period by going through the Stanfield line to pay dirt and it was during this same period that Stanfield made a concerted drive for their only score.

In the second half Baker added more points by scoring twice, one of the touchdowns being set up by a pass interception by Herb Peterson. Bristow and Peterson each scored another TD in the 4th quarter, one on a 40 yard pass play and another after a 40 yard pass and run that ended on Stanfield's one yard line.

The Ione squad isn't expecting too much trouble from McEwan this weekend, as its season has been much poorer than the Cardinals'.

Moro Drops Heppner 6 to 0; Final Game Wednesday at Echo

The Heppner high school Mustangs received their first setback on the home field last Friday when the Moro eleven walked away after the final gun with the honors. The score was 6 to 0.

The game was, according to coach Steve Trukositz, "the roughest game of football I have seen Heppner play in my two years of coaching here."

In the first quarter a very rough defense was displayed by both teams with neither getting much farther than the 40 yard line. The second period was the decisive quarter when, with four seconds

to go and on their own seven yard line, Heppner attempted a quick kick only to have it blocked and find a Moro player scooping up the ball on the payoff side of the goal line.

The third quarter was hard fought also, with both teams penetrating to the opponents 10 yard line but bogged down at that point. Halfway through the final period the Mustangs had their hands on the ball again but ran out of downs and though Moro took over they couldn't do much either against the eight-man line thrown up in front of them by Heppner's defensive captain, Ralph Marlatt.

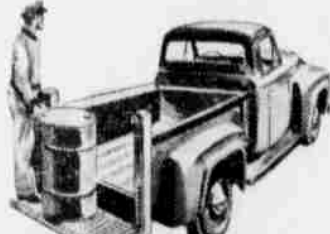

Chilean Missionary To Speak Twice Here This Weekend

Rev. Randall Crawford, Oregon City, who recently returned from 12 years of foreign service with the Board of Missions of the Methodist church, will speak to two groups this weekend at the Heppner Methodist church, pastor Rev. Lester D. Boulden announced this week.

Rev. Crawford will speak to the members of the Union Missionary Society at 2 p. m. Saturday at its meeting at the Methodist church and will be the guest speaker again Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at the regular Methodist service.

Rev. Crawford, with his wife and three children have spent 12 years in educational work among the Indians in Chile, doing much of their traveling by plane. When Rev. and Mrs. Crawford left Oregon City, they flew a two-place Piper plane to the South American country, covering the 9,000 miles in 25 days. He used it extensively in his travels while in the country and before leaving, sold it to a Chilean Airplane club who reconditioned it and are still using it.

The missionary spent a majority of his time aiding with the development of a more active rural life and agricultural program among the two million small farmers and farm laborers in Chile. He was also very active in aiding in the construction of rural primary schools and the churches.

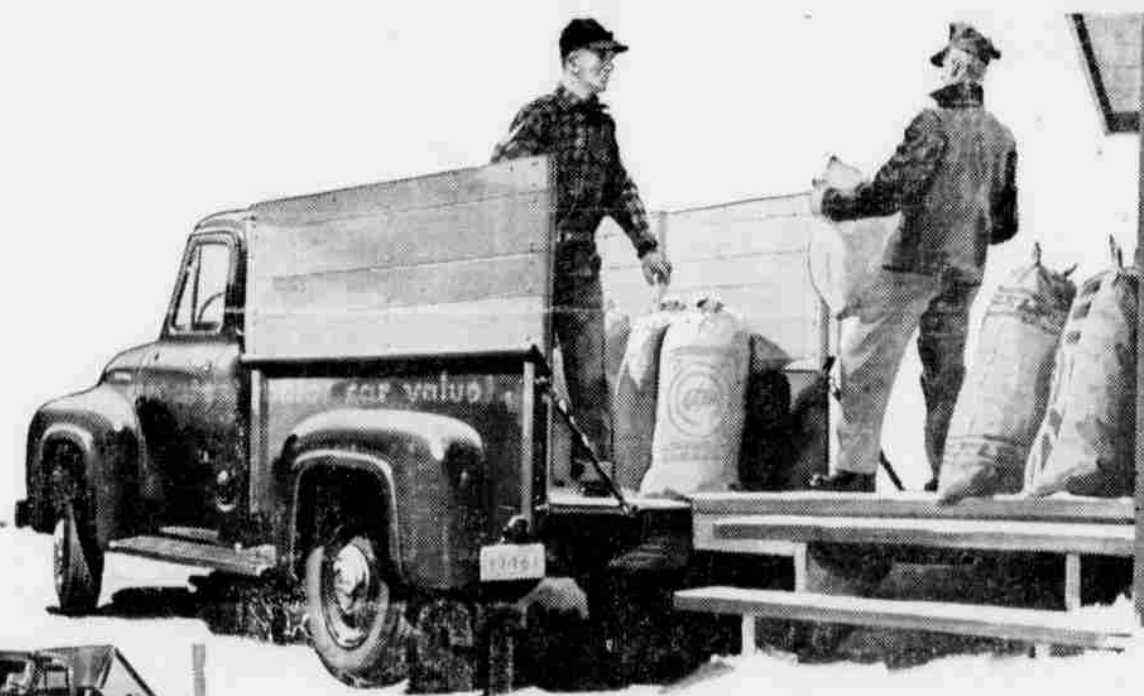
