We held our first meeting Wed. Oct. 27 at our leader, Mrs. Anderson's home.

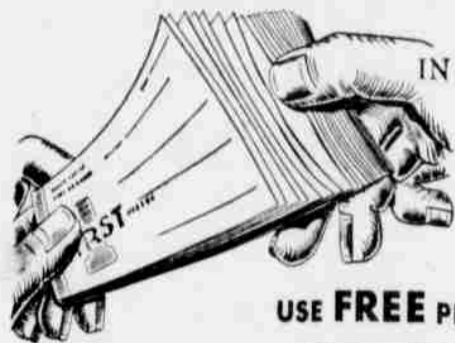

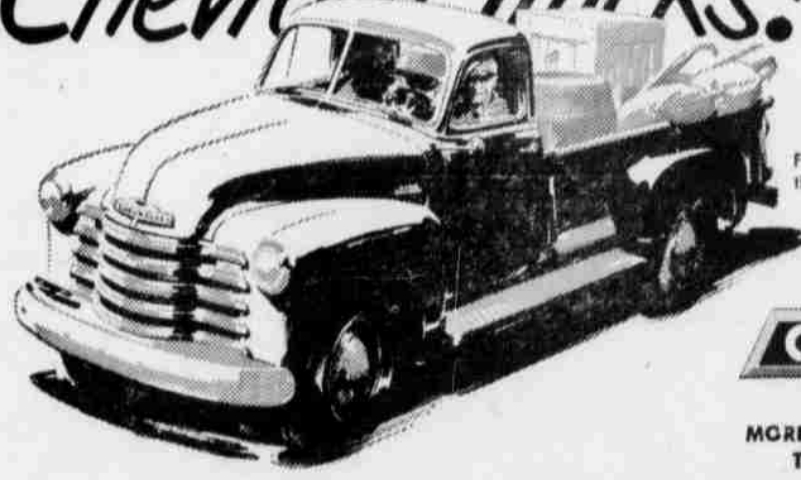
