Timely Tips

An old tooth brush makes a wonderfully handy tool for cleaning jewelry, combs or other hard-to-get-at places. Put a little household ammonia in soap suds, and you can whisk them clean in no time.

When things are too hot to touch, hang them up and let an electric fan blow on them. They'll be ready for fronting a lot sooner, and have a pleasant freshness about them.

Garden tools will winter well if they are scrubbed clean and all metal surfaces coated with oil before they are put away.

Try office desk blotters on your shelves under glassware and china. They're colorful, and will absorb any moisture that may collect.

That nasty onion odor can be completely obliterated from your hands. Just wash them in vinegar.

To keep floors from being marred when moving furniture, slip old, heavy woolen socks over the legs.

A folded damp cloth placed under a mixing bowl will keep it from slipping while you are mixing.

When starch sticks and burns on the bottom of your iron, don't use an abrasive to clean it. Sprinkle a little baking soda on a damp cloth and rub the iron until clean. The soda won't scratch the ironing surface.

Reaction Time Vital In Driving Safety

How long does it take to stop a car?

This may seem to be an elementary question, but the state traffic safety division maintains that thousands of drivers become traffic statistics because they either cannot answer this question or answer it incorrectly.

For example, the division says at 20 miles an hour it takes 52 feet to stop a car, providing the driver has an average reaction time, the car has average brakes, and the highway condition is normal. Add rain, poor brakes or a slow-reacting driver and the distance required to stop immediately increases.

Reaction time, incidentally, is the time it takes you to get your foot on the brake after you see danger ahead. For the average person, this is three-fourths of a second.

Stopping distances at higher rates of speed, which prevail in rural areas, explain why the open road is the most deadly place

to be involved in a collision.

Most people, the safety officer says, drive too fast to avoid an accident should they or another driver commit a blunder. At 50 miles an hour, a car will travel 55 feet before a driver can even get his foot on the brake pedal. Once he starts applying the pressure, he will travel 187.5 feet before the vehicle stops. This makes a total stopping distance of 242.5 feet.

At 60 miles an hour stopping distance is 336 feet. Small wonder, the division adds, that many drivers are caught short in emergencies; that time they thought they could stop on disappears.
