Field Day Scheduled At Ontario Station

A feeder cattle demonstration field day will be held at the Malheur agricultural experiment station, Ontario, December 2. The program will start at 1:30 p. m., reports John Landers, extension animal husbandry specialist at Oregon State college.

During the demonstration, the visitors will be shown points to look for in determining feeder cattle grades. Ed Coles, OSC extension livestock marketing specialist, says the field day, by helping the producer to determine the different grades of cattle, will enable a better interpretation of market information.

Landers says the cattle being used for the field day are part of a winter feeding demonstration being conducted by the experiment station. The demonstration will be explained at the field day. In the spring, after the project is completed, another field day will be conducted to acquaint producers with slaughter grades of cattle.

Our next meeting will be held at 9:00 on December 5 at Judy Thompson's, unless otherwise notified.

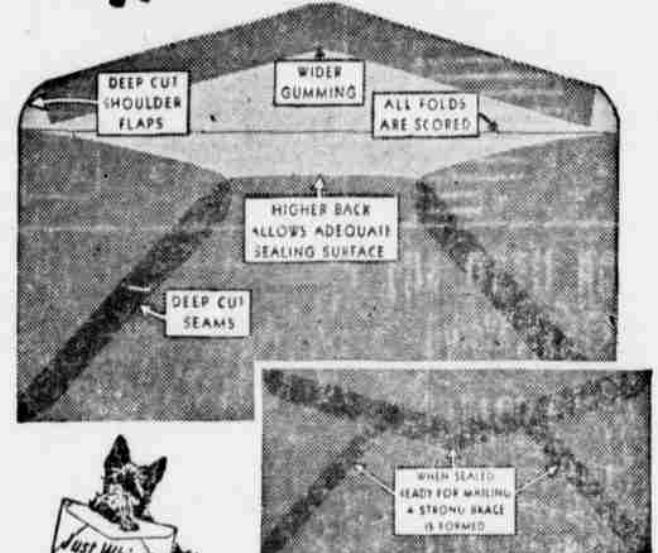

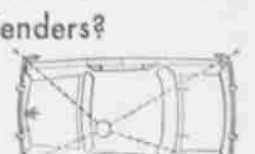
