First of Conference Series at EOCE Set for December 5

Plans are being made for the first in a series of three regional interest conferences to be held on the campus of Eastern Oregon College at La Grande. The conferences are scheduled on the calendar of the 25th anniversary year of the college, with the first to be held on December 5.

At noon on December 5, a no-host luncheon will be held in Hoke Hall, Dr. Victor P. Morris, Acting President of the University of Oregon, will be the featured luncheon speaker. Reservations may be made on or before December 3.

Six members of the Kellogg Foundation Study at the University of Oregon will present aspects of "Inter-Departmental Cooperation in Studying the Community" in the college auditorium during the day. Dr. Donald E. Tope, Director of the Kellogg Program at the University, will lead off the morning presentation. His subject will be "Trends and Developments in Inter-Institutional Cooperation." The talk is designed to give an insight into how different departments of the college have cooperated and worked together in gathering information about communities for the use by school administrators and others.

A footnote to the calendar states: "We believe that school administrators, teachers looking forward to school administration, school board members, PTA members, city officials, and citizens interested in community betterment and planning will be interested in the conferences."
