Practice A-3 in the 1954 ACP program is one that will be most popular with wheat farmers in the use of their diverted acres. It provides for initial establishment on cropland of perennial or biennial legumes or perennial grasses or mixtures of legumes and perennial grasses to retard erosion and to improve soil structure, permeability or water holding capacity as a part of a crop rotation. This practice is not in general use throughout the state of Oregon, because in most counties it cannot be said that legumes and grasses are not generally in use. It is devised only for certain parts of the state, including the wheat areas in this county where grasses and legumes are not part of any well established crop rotation.

An interesting feature is that the payment cannot be made if the land already in grass and legumes exceeds 35% of the cropland, and the payment will be made up to only 35% of the cropland. In those places where it does not apply, the cost sharing of the government is more attractive than under former programs, because the following things are covered:

1. 50% payment for the cost of the seed.
2. 5c per pound for available phosphate.
3. 10c per pound for the available nitrogen used in establishing the seed.

There is no limit in this practice as to the use of the crop. It can be used for pasture, hay, silage, seed production, or it can be just not used at all. In Morrow county, the County PMA Committee are happy over this practice as it can be considered to apply throughout the entire county. In those areas grass or legume seeding for rotation purposes has been demonstrated but the seeding is not at all in general use.

Note that in the title, the first word is initial establishment.

New GMC Trucks on Display December 18

The first of a shipment of 1954 GMC trucks, combining functional styling and a 125 horsepower engine in the light line will arrive at Farley Pontiac company, Heppner GMC dealer, and will be on display Dec. 18, James J. Farley announced this week.

In addition to styling and extra power for the light duty GMCs, truck Hydra-Matic has been extended through the medium duty classifications which range up to 45,000 lbs. gross combination weight. The Hydra-Matic transmission for these medium duty trucks and highway tractors has eight speeds forward and two in reverse and is patterned after those used in the famed GMC 6x6 military trucks that went through the most rugged conditions on the battlefields of Korea.

At 125 horsepower, the 248 cubic inch gasoline engine makes the GMC light trucks the most powerful of any in the half-ton and one-ton field, Farley said.

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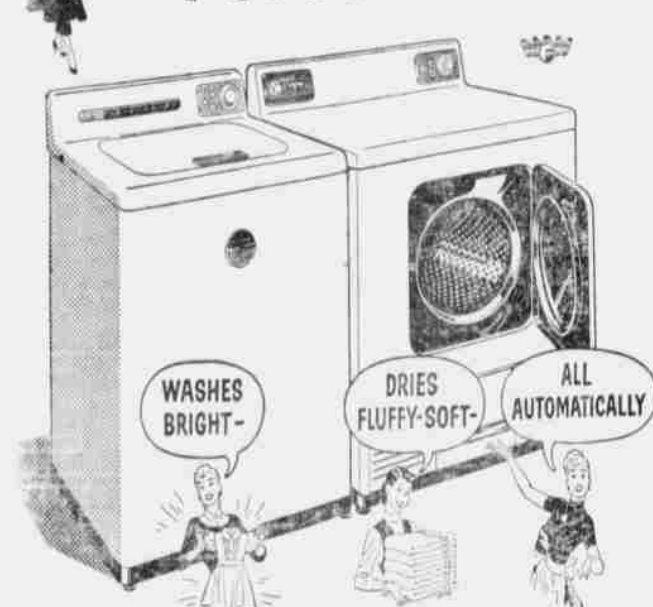
