



NEW INTERSTATE BRIDGE—The first interstate bridge across the Columbia east of Portland capable of carrying all loads will be open to the public December 18. Governors Paul L. Patterson of Oregon and Arthur B. Langlie of Washington will participate in joint ceremonies dedicating the bridge and celebrating first pour of concrete at The Dalles Dam. The Dalles interstate bridge, located about two miles east of The Dalles, is a direct link between Washington's Evergreen highway and Oregon's The Dalles-California highway and the water grade Columbia highway. The bridge will serve to make this the shortest route between Seattle and California. It was built by Wasco county, Oregon, with work being done by Atkinson-Ostrander Contractors. The steel structure of the bridge, over water, is 3,340 feet. Length of bridge approaches are 2.9 miles. Dedication ceremonies will be held Friday, December 18, beginning at 11:00 a. m.

Home Decorations Simple to Make, Add Holiday Cheer

Easy-to-make Christmas decorations to carry the holiday atmosphere all through the house are suggested by Mary Beth Minden, Oregon State college extension home management specialist.

A Christmas tree table or man-

tel decoration is both simple and effective, she says. To make it, first cut a cone-shaped pattern from heavy paper, about 18 inches high with a two-inch overlap for the seam. Pin the pattern to fine chicken wire and cut around the edge with tin snips. Then take off the paper and fasten the wire together to look like a Christmas tree. Fill in the hole with two-inch pieces of fir bough.

This tree may be decorated with red ribbon bows, strings of popcorn or cranberries, or paper ornaments. Miss Minden suggests. This decorating might be fun for the children to do.

Oregon Women Stress Needs For Consumer Education on Meats

Women need more information on meat uses and buying, representatives of consumer groups throughout the state agreed recently. They met at Oregon State college to compile the consumer committee report for the campus January 6 and 7.

Mrs. Mabel Mack, assistant director of the OSC extension service and secretary for the consumer group, said a consumer education program will be one of the recommendations submitted to the conference.

While the women agreed that as evergreen ball—sometimes called a kissing ball—is adaptable for either Christmas or New Year's, she says.

The base for it is moss formed into a ball four inches or more in diameter. String of fine wire wrapped in all directions holds it in shape. A length of wire is left free to hang the completed ball.

Stick short sprigs of evergreens and clusters of berries into the base until it is completely filled. For a "kissing ball," put mistletoe at the bottom. Small Christmas tree ornaments fastened on wire may be poked into the ball for added color. This arrangement is good to hang in doorways or from garlands, Miss Minden suggests.

Another simple but effective arrangement is a charm string of cones for the doorway she says. Wire connects the cones in a pleasing arrangement and a branch or two of pine adds the green background.
