loan unless they build some storage between now and July 1. For those paying income taxes, the government is helping by allowing a man to depreciate such new storage at the rate of 20% per year for five years, dedicating the depreciation from sales as allowed expense. A lot of educational work will be done on this problem between now and harvest time.



BIG TRUCKS TARGETS

A uniform plan of taxation of out-of-state trucks will be offered to the legislatures of 11 western states during their next sessions.

An act is now in the processing stage with the Western Interstate Committee on Highway Policy Problems acting as a clearing agency of surveys, complications and drafts that are being made by the Council of State Governments, research groups from Stanford University and truckers.

The large trucking interests express opposition to the change from the present so-called Montana plan, a reciprocity method of negotiated agreements between states, which state officials declare is unnecessarily expensive.

Fixed as essential points by the committee is a weight-mile tax for large haulers from out-of-state, use of the interstate plate instead of being required to carry plates issued by each state in which the truck is operated.

If plans are adopted as proposed, Oregon would have to pass only a short amendment to the present motor vehicle code.

STATE BUILDING HELD UP

The four million dollar state institutional building program was threatened this week with the delay of immediate construction of one of the major units, the \$1,250,000 reformatory.

After advertising for bids for a 300 acre site and receiving 12 replies, the State Board of Control discovered that the Legislature had neglected to give the board authority to buy a site.

Dean H. Walker, Independence, and Henry Semon, Klamath Falls, chairmen of the Ways and Means committees of the legislature, reportedly told the board that it was the intention of the committee that the board could use a part of the appropriation to buy a site for the reformatory.

The board asked Attorney General, Robert Y. Thornton, if it could use a portion of the appropriation for purchasing a site. If the A. G. rules that the board cannot then the board would have to wait for the 1953 legislature to correct the omission of the ways and means committees.

STATE FAIR MADE PROFIT

This year's Oregon State Fair was the most successful financially, as well as in attendance, since the fair was started in 1861. Leo Spitzbart, manager, said Saturday in his annual report to the state fair commission. There was a net profit of \$85,000.

Total income was \$463,028 total expenses, including substantial improvements in fairgrounds, buildings and equipment, were \$397,733. The official total at-

tendance at the fair was 313,881, an increase of 15,455 over 1952.

The fair has established an outstanding record among fairs in America for paying operating, maintenance and capital investment costs almost entirely out of operating income for more than 20 years. Dr. E. B. Stewart, of Roseburg, fair commission chairman stated.

"RELOCATING" COUNTIES

Oregon's "floating" counties, Klamath and Hood River, this week were permanently located, as far as timber cutting taxes are concerned.

After a jousting between the tax commission and timber cutters of the counties, it was ruled that Klamath county is east of the Cascade summit and according to the 1953 forest law, is required to pay only 4 cents per thousand feet on their cut timber. Hood River is required to pay 8 cents as another codicil of the law says any county which "is dissected by the summit of the Cascades shall be in the west zone."

JOBS VANISHING

Unemployment clouded Oregon's economy in November with 45,860 jobless persons listed by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission who received a total of \$1,437,638, second highest November total on record and a 60 percent increase over October.

During November there were 18,500 workers laid off making the largest monthly increase since January 1950. There were 29,000 claims filed for compensation during November; 60 percent of them were in the seasonal lumber, food and construction industries.

The slow lumber market caused about 1,000 lumber operators to reduce production.

School Support Funds Received in County

A total of \$34,338.06 has been received by the Morrow county schools on the December payment from the Basic School Support fund, Leslie Grant, county school superintendent, said today. In addition to the August

payment of \$47,924.72, this makes a total of \$72,262.78 received in 1953.

One more payment will be made to Morrow county in February or March for the current yearly period. Grant said. This money is made available to schools by legislation allowing \$80 per census child and distributed on the basis of transportation, number of teachers and the daily attendance of students.

The basic school support money has been coming from surplus income in the state and represents a saving of between seven and eight mills to Morrow County taxpayers.

Total distribution to Morrow county school districts to date follows: Heppner, \$35,754.17; Irion, \$13,683.45; Lexington, \$7,055.42; Boardman, 10,445.03; Ione, \$12,620.60; Hardman, \$1,820.94 and Non-High, \$775.06.

Individuals may obtain free-use permits for cutting Christmas trees on the national forest, Wayne West, district ranger, said today. These permits should be obtained prior to cutting.

Trees should be cut with 16 inch stump or less. West pointed out. People should cruise around to find the exact tree they want before cutting. Large trees should not be cut to obtain a small top. Trees should never be cut on private land without the permission of the owner, it was stressed.
