STATE TAX LOOMS AGAIN

The possibility of a state levy on real property is foreseen by Senator Howard C. Belton, chairman of the legislative committee on taxation who has had 5 years experience in the Senate and two in the House.

"The reason for a property tax is a simple one", the Canby Senator says, "the state is spending more than it is taking in. This was brought about by the people voting for measures that call for loads outside the 6 per cent limitation. The legislature does not write the tax program."

He said, "The personal property tax is the most difficult of all types of taxation because the owner is required to place a value on his property. It results in a duel in the dark between the assessor and the property owner. The last state property tax in Oregon was levied in 1940.

EXPLOSIVE SITUATION Trustees at Oregon Penitentiary or visitors could seize control of the present arsenal located in the hall of the institution's administrative building, Warden Gladden informed the State Board of Control, Tuesday.

The board approved construction of an arsenal tower outside the pen walls. The new \$20,000 tower will avail a view of the entire prison area.

BALDOCK HONORED Oregon's State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock, presided at a meeting of the Highway Research Board in Washington, D. C. last week.

The Highway Research Board

is a part of the National Academy of Science which studies highway problems and draws its members from industry, colleges, universities and highway departments. Baldock has been chairman of the board for the past two years.

WORLD COOPERATION BEST

"Our wisest course is to cooperate with friendly nations and continue efforts to improve conditions of life everywhere," Mrs. Oswald B. Lord, New York City, told an audience consisting of many state officials at Willamette University, Wednesday night.

Speaking as a representative of the United Nations commission on human rights, Mrs. Lord welcomed constructive criticism of the organization. "Destructive criticism," she said, "is based on a lack of knowledge of the facts."

She credited the United Nations with the clearing up of a "ticklish" situation in Burma when nationalist Chinese forces were induced to leave that country after they had made an uninvited appearance there.

SEVEN NEW ARMORIES

The state department received news Thursday that federal funds will be made available for armories in Pendleton, Newberg, Medford, St. Helens, Hood River, Gresham and Redmond.

The cities must provide armory sites. Armories at The Dalles, Milton, Preewater, Baker and Forest Grove are nearing completion. Construction of another has been started at Hillsboro and bids will be opened soon for one at Burns.

CAPITAL SHORTS

Applications for jobs with the state are rising. There were 48 applications for the position of director of the civil service commission when the deadline expired Friday.

The Oregon State Hospital admitted 2,495 mentally ill patients in 1953, compared with a normal figure of 2,400. Applicants for positions as property appraisals work with the State Land Board must file before Feb. 7. Plans to raise funds to fight a tiny soil insect that eats plant roots were made this week by Oregon Canners Assn.

Management Hints For Hog Producer Outlined by OSC

Oregon hog producers, during these days of the price-cost squeeze, need to use every good management method available, says John Landers, extension animal husbandry specialist at Oregon State college.

He lists the following steps that will help in efficient, low-cost production.

First, feed sows carefully before and after breeding. This is important in helping assure a thrifty litter of pigs, the first requirement in a profitable hog enterprise.

Second, get pigs to market weight as soon as possible. This, along with raising more pigs per sow, is the key to high profits. Saving the most pigs per litter depends on good feeding and proper care—using pig brooders, guard rails, and heat when necessary.

Third, for low-cost production, it's important to keep pigs growing fast right from the start. Pigs gain best when they are young. When animals are two weeks old, start them on a good creep feed—any reputable commercial pig starter is a good investment at this period. If pigs learn to eat while young, selling time comes

much sooner and at less cost. Fourth maintain good sanitation. It pays off too. A disease-free pig not bothered by internal parasites will gain faster on less feed. It's also worthwhile to castrate all boar pigs when they are from two to four weeks old. There is less loss of blood and less shock when the operation is performed at an early age. Move sow and litter to clean pasture when pigs are 2 to 3 weeks of age the specialist advises.
