Livestock Prices Holding Steady

HERMISTON—Rufus Piper of Lexington topped the market at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday with a 320 lb. white sow, which sold for \$21.90 cwt., Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reported.

Prices remained steady despite generally lower quality cattle and hogs. Volume was down somewhat. 98 consignments bringing 296 cattle compared with 335 the previous Friday, 85 hogs compared with 92 and 133 sheep compared with 112.

The first ewes with lambs at side of the season brought \$23.25 per pair, \$14.50 to \$18.50 per head. Packers, feeders and farmer buyers from Oregon and Washington furnished broad and active demand. Largest farmer buyer, O. C. Hughes, Hermiston, bought 41 head of commercial grade Hereford springer heifers. Especially in demand currently among farmer buyers are stock cattle.

Cows: Dairy cows 112.50-162.50 hd.; dairy heifers 31.00-57.00 hd.; stock cows 112.50-127.50 hd.

Slaughter cows: Commercial 14.75-15.50 cwt.; utility 13.25-14.50 canner-cutter 8.50-10.25 cwt.; a few Holsteins to \$12.20; shells 5.50-7.25.
