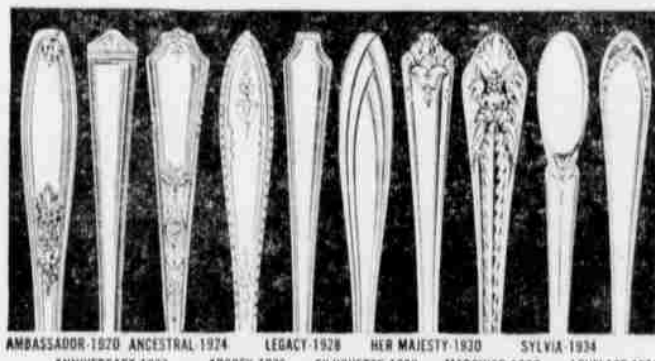
Dances Planned at Condon Air Base
