office Saturday by filing for the Republication nomination for governor. For the past six years he has also served as a member of the state board of control and numerous other state boards. In 1950 he was elected president of the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators and now is president of the National Association of Secretaries of State. In a statement Saturday he said he would recommend statutory protection for Oregon business and labor in dealings with the state, would augment efforts to build up the rich tourist trade which furnishes Oregon's largest out-state income and would recommend driver training in high schools.

APPEAL LIFE SENTENCE

A petition for a rehearing of the Bonnie Lee Kaunanahousen case has been filed with the Oregon Supreme Court by Clackamas county District Attorney W. L. Bradshaw. She was sentenced to life imprisonment when found guilty of a first degree murder charge. When her case was appealed to the Oregon Supreme Court she was freed by a 4 to 3 vote on the point that she did not have a speedy trial as required by law. In his petition to the court this week Bradshaw argued that her trial was not unreasonably delayed.

MORE PAROLE ACTIVITIES

The Oregon Parole Board should be enlarged in order to extend its activities, according to advice from the National Probation and Parole Assn. received this week. More members and an assistant director were among the major recommendations. The findings of the national association will be considered by the state advisory committee on probation and paroles at a meeting in Portland, March 27, and presented to the 1955 legislature probably in the form of bills.

Stockmen Make Plans For Year's Activities

Meeting Monday evening, the executive committee of the Morrow County Livestockgrowers Association took care of current business and made plans for association activities for the year. Membership chairman, Marion Finch, Heppner, reported that every livestockman in Morrow county would soon be given the opportunity to join the association. Voluntary contributions are now being received by the association for their livestock theft prevention program. The executive committee agreed that the program would not be put under way until more contributions were received to insure them of adequate funds for reward money.

The committee urged livestockgrowers to continue establishing trial seedings, comparing grazing alfalfas for dry land pasture. While the association will not put any money into this project, this year, they will secure seed of five alfalfa varieties which includes rhizoma, severa, nomad, dadak and ranger as cost for those wishing to compare the five. In 1953, the association expended \$150 in encouraging such seedings. Approximately 300 acres of these alfalfas were planted in the county.

Plans were made for a representative of the association to appear with other livestock associations throughout the state before the emergency board, meeting in Salem on March 5. The group will ask for cooperation and funds for a Lepo Spirosis control program which threatens Oregon. Thirty Oregon counties who have outbreaks of this disease. W. W. Weatherford, marketing committee chairman, reported that machinery was now moving toward encouraging the 8,000 weaner calves, exported from Morrow county each year, to be fed out here at home.
