Mildred and Margery Bristow of Portland are visiting their grandmother, Mrs. Etta Bristow and other relatives here.

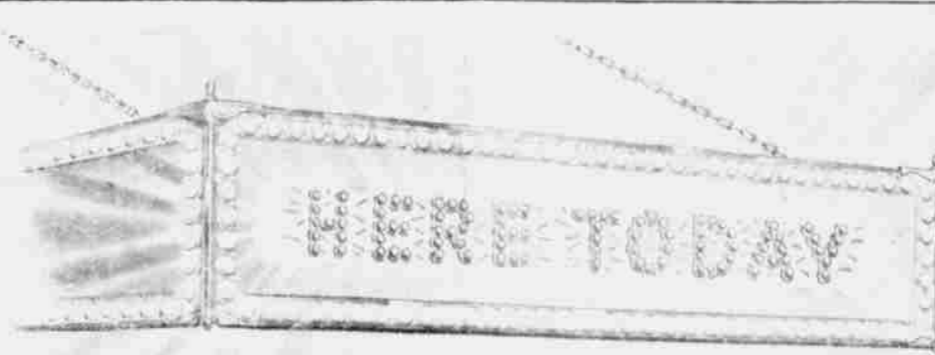
