OSC Study Shows Big Frozen Food Demand

Grocery stores of tomorrow may have more cabinet space and storage room for frozen foods to keep up with growing demand, according to an Oregon State college agricultural experiment station study.

G. B. Davis, associate agricultural economist, noted that use of frozen foods increased 3½ times per person between 1942 and 1952, creating new marketing problems.

His research showed that frozen food sales are greater when more space is set up for them. However, there are fewer sales in relation to cabinet space.

The study is published as circular of information 537, "Re-


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
