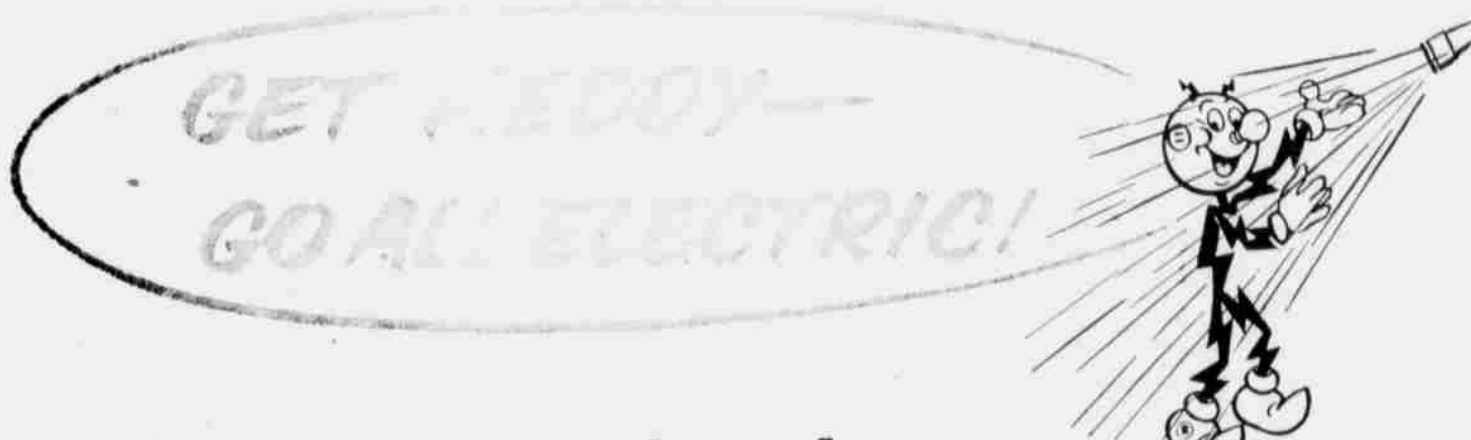
strom, who is ill in the hospital in Heppner. Mrs. Crutchers returned to her home for a few days last week to attend the high school graduation exercises for her son, Lee.

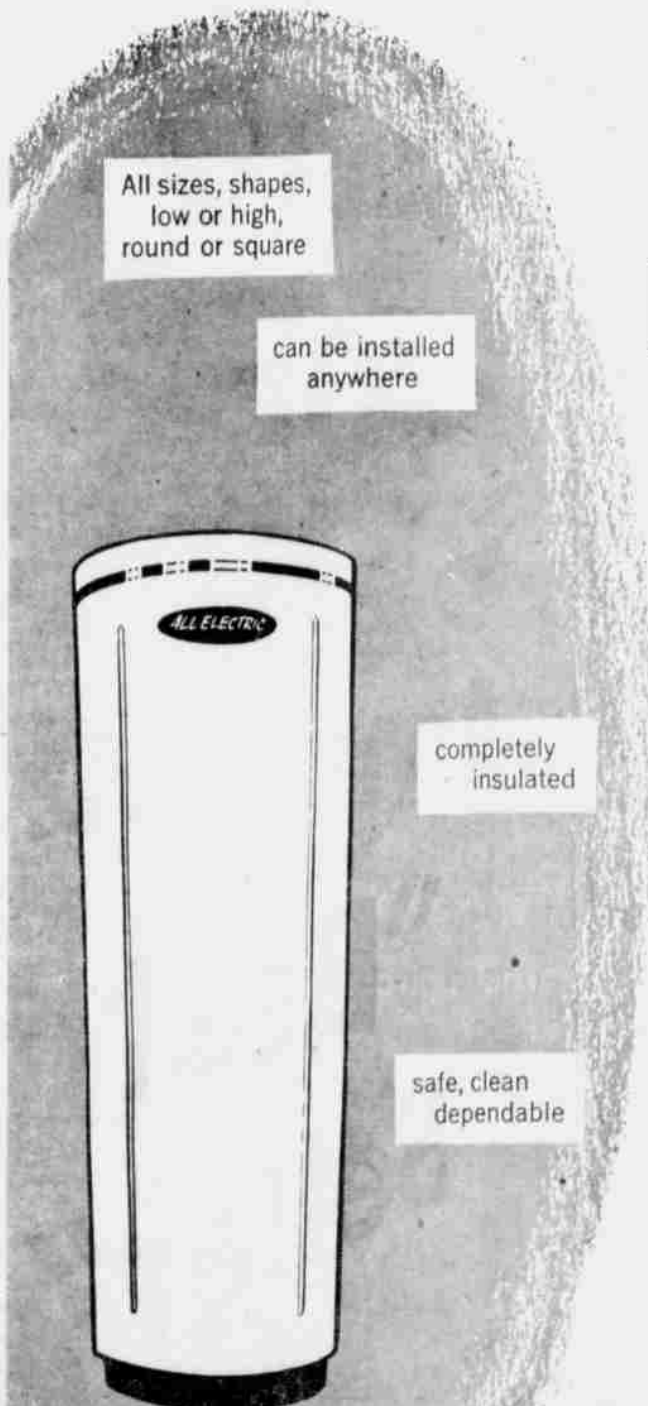
