

### Cattle Volume Continues High

HERMISTON—C. K. Peck of Lexington topped the market at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday with a 168 lb. Angus bull selling for \$17.30 cwt., Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports.

Volume of cattle consigned continued to increase, the 621 cattle comparing with 567 the previous Friday. Also consigned were 193 hogs compared with 152 and 41 sheep compared with 43.

Demand was broad and active with trading brisk, and packers, feeder and farmer buyers were represented. Newcomer to the auction was Economy Packing Co., Long Creek.

Cattle were generally steady in price, with canner-cutter cattle down 50¢ cwt. Sows were down about one dollar and hogs were down a dollar in line with other markets where supply remained steady and demand declined.

Largest consigner was Dr. Harold P. Kahler, Walla Walla, with 101 head of mixed cattle.

Particularly in demand next Friday are yearlings and feeder steers. Some 120 pairs of stock cows and calves are expected from one consigner.

### Tourists to Learn State Traffic Laws

Out-of-state vacationists will be familiarized with Oregon traffic laws as a part of the state's continuing program to reduce summer traffic deaths, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby said Friday.

This year, as last year, 20,000 copies of a state department pamphlet, "See Oregon Safely," will be distributed to "foreign" licensed drivers by members of the Oregon Motor Court Association. The pamphlet contains brief explanations of some of the state's most important traffic regulations and several safe-driving suggestions.

Last year, the department said, non-resident drivers were involved in 85 fatal accidents and nearly 6,990 other mishaps, a substantial reduction over the 1952 record of 71 fatal accidents involvements and 7,450 non-fatal mishaps.

Traffic of all kinds during the three vacation months, June, July and August, claimed 98 lives with 113 killed during the same period in 1952.

### Chevrolet Corvette Sports Car Shown

Jerry McElligott, Ione, an air cadet who has been transferred from Missouri to San Antonio, Texas stopped in Heppner last weekend with a new Chevrolet Corvette sports car. He had received delivery of the car in Missouri in April and drove through here enroute to his new assignment.

The smart white plastic car attracted considerable attention as it is the first one to be seen in this part of the country. The model, which sports a 150 horsepower motor and is rated as being able to do 120 miles an hour, carries two passengers. It has an automatic powerglide transmission, bright red leather upholstery and cost Cadet McElligott about \$4,200. He said it is very quiet, has a smooth ride and is excellent on turns. It is strictly a sports type car, and one of the first to be produced with a plastic body.

McElligott said he ordered the car last August, receiving delivery only last month. It comes equipped with a radio and heater.

### State Gas Sales Up During Month

Gasoline sales in Oregon during the month of April again showed an increase over sales for the same period in 1953. Secretary of State Earl T. Newby disclosed this week. Total sales reported were 47,074,620 gallons, an increase of 753,013 gallons.

Total taxes paid on the gasoline to the state was \$2,824,477.25, Newby notes, a gain of \$45,180.75 over April of last year. The first three months of 1954 showed a decrease in gasoline sales, but March and April increases show a net gain for the period of January 1, to April 30, of this year of 604,047 gallons, and \$36,236.76 in taxes, over the same period in 1953.
