

Ione Area Grain Now Pouring Into Local Elevators

Most of the farmers in this community will be harvesting this week. The Archer Daniels and the Morrow County Grain Growers elevators here in Ione report 20,000 bushels of wheat each, coming into their elevators a day. A smaller amount is coming into the McNabb and Jordan elevators. Much grain is coming in at the Morgan elevator.

Leonard Carlson, in the Gooseberry community cut his first field of Rex wheat last week and it averaged 38 bushels per acre. He put nitrogen on his farm last fall which he thinks helped to make the large yield. Wheat north of Ione was reported 21 to 28 bushels per acre. Some barley was going a ton to the acre.

27 farmers voted here Friday, July 23 on the wheat controls, 126 for and 1 against.
